## Hospital to hold grand re-opening

Cameron Parish will have some very distinguished visitors when the grand re-opening of the South Cameron Memorial Hospital is held on Tuesday, March 18 at 2 p.m. Former President George H. Bush and his wife, Barbara, and country music star Sammy Kershaw will be on hand for the occasion. President Bush took part in the ground breaking for the hospital in December, 2006. However, the other big celebrity present at the time, movie star George Clooney, is unable to return.

Local attorney Jennifer Jones, who is coordinating the re-opening celebration and the visit of the President and Mrs. Bush, said the public is invited to the event to be held at hospital site midway between Cameron and Creole.

The newly reconstructed, 26 bed facility features an emergency room and diagnostic center, including x-ray, CT scan and MRI, plus a fully-equipped, state of the art laboratory.

## Parish taxes approved

Cameron parish voters approved four property taxes in four special districts in the voting Saturday, providing for recreation, water, ambulance service and fire protection. The results were as follows:

Hackberry voters approved a 2.52-mill, 10-year property tax 79-21 or 79 percent to 21 percent.

The tax, expected to raise \$55,000 a year, will fund and maintain recreation facilities in the district.

Waterworks District 10 voters approved a 4-mill, 10-year property tax 26-8 or 76 percent to 24 percent.

The \$208,000 a year raised by the tax will be used to operate and maintain the water systems within the district.

Voters in the Lower Cameron Ambulance Service District voted 169-13, or 93 percent to 7 percent, for a 4.44 mill, 10-year property tax. The tax, expected to gen-

erate about \$357,000 a year, will be used to fund ambulance service in the district.

Voters in Fire Protection District 7 approved a 4.12 mill, 10-year property tax by a 54-10 margin, or 84 percent to 16 percent.

The tax, expected to raise \$35,000 a year, will operate and maintain facilities and equipment in the district.

## Tax list told

Elsewhere in this issue of the Pilot is a listing of property in Cameron Parish on which the 2007 taxes have not been paid.

If the taxes are not paid by Wednesday, May 7, 2008, the Cameron Sheriff Dept., which is the tax collector, will put the property up for sale at the front door of the courthouse in Cameron.

Interest and advertising cost will be added to the taxes.

The list of property in the current advertisement is for owners who the tax collector does not have a current address. Another listing of property for which there are addresses will be run at a later date.

## Towing firm to open new facility here

Moran Towing of Lake Charles has signed an agreement to provide tug service for the Semptra LNG's Cameron LNG receipt terminal located near Hackberry, it has been announced by the Cameron Office of Planning and Development after months of negotiation.

Moran plans to build a new 250-foot steel dock and maintenance facility in Cameron Parish.

"We are pleased to become a member of the community and plan to fill as many of the 40 new jobs from the local region as possible," said Jeffrey Beech of Moran Towing. "The staff of the Cameron Parish Planning and Development office was instrumental in the search for a suitable site, offering advice and assistance for situating in Cameron Parish."

Currently more than 70% complete, the Cameron LNG receipt terminal will be capable of processing up to 1.5 billion cubic feet of natural gas per day. Construction on the terminal is expected to be complete in late 2008.

Liquefied natural gas, or LNG, is natural gas that has been supercooled to minus 260 degrees Fahrenheit. At that temperature, natural gas condenses into a liquid.

When in liquid form, natural gas takes up to 600 times less space than in its gaseous state, which makes it feasible to transport over long distances. In the form of LNG, natural gas can be shipped from the parts of the world where it is abundant to where it is in demand.

## Wetland Walkway reopens

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Creole Nature Trail All-American Road representatives invite the public to Sabine National Wildlife Refuge's Wetland Walkway on Wednesday, March 19, at 10:30 a.m. to celebrate the re-opening of the Wetland Walkway and other refuge recreation areas located along the Creole Nature Trail.

The refuge is located on Hwy. 27, approximately 26 miles south of Sulphur and 11 miles south of Hackberry or about 7 miles north of Holly Beach.

It's been two and a half years since the Sabine Refuge, a major part of the Creole Nature Trail, was

devastated by Hurricane Rita and had to be closed to the public. Prior to Hurricane Rita, the Creole Nature Trail All-American Road served nearly 300,000 visitors annually.

"The overwhelming community support, especially the partnership with the Creole Nature Trail, was critical in obtaining recovery funding for the entire Southwest Louisiana National Wildlife Refuge Complex," said Sam D. Hamilton, the Service's Southeast Regional Director.

According to the Project Leader of the Southwest Louisiana National Wildlife Refuge Complex, Don Voros,

all of Sabine Refuge's recreation areas have undergone extensive re-building. The one and a half mile Wetland Walkway, the most visited portion of the Creole Nature Trail, needed comprehensive

## Parish deputy badly hurt in accident

An off duty Cameron Parish deputy was seriously injured in a one vehicle accident early Saturday morning. The Sheriff's Office responded to a call at 12:29 a.m. that a vehicle had overturned on Hwy 27 in Cameron, just west of Ready Rental.

Investigator Jake McCain said Steve Sturlese, 37, was westbound and left the roadway near mile marker 35.9. Failing to make the curve, the 2006 GMC pickup went into the ditch and struck a driveway and culvert, causing it to roll over several times, ejecting the driver. There were no passengers.

Sturlese was transported to South Cameron Memorial Hospital and then air lifted to Lafayette General Hospital, where he remains in critical condition.

Results of a standard blood alcohol test will not be available for several days, however neither alcohol nor weather were considered to be a factors by officers on the scene.

The speed of the vehicle has not been determined, but the GMC truck series is governed at 97 mph and could not have exceeded that speed, according to McCain. "We see this type of rollover accident often in the parish," McCain said. "It is caused by the angle of the vehicle when it goes over the embankment and the wheels dig in."

They had always lived in mobile homes, never a house, and had little hope of even getting another trailer.

When Council on Aging Director Dinah Landry called one day to ask if they would like a house, they said

never mind, they couldn't afford a house. Landry said, "You don't understand, I'm talking about a free house." The Heberts could hardly believe it, but it was true. Mennonite Disaster Services, in conjunction with other local agencies, was offering them a free house. It was dedicated last Thursday, March 6.

People in Hackberry say the Heberts are sweet, wonderful people, and they are happy they are getting a home. Their pastor, Jason Dunham, of First Baptist Church, Hackberry, prayed

that the house would be a place of joy and a light to the community.

Planning began a year ago this month, Landry said, with construction beginning Jan. 7 of this year. Julie Burleigh, who works with Americorps volunteers, related that after the layout of the house was determined, she got a call from the Heberts. They wanted her to know that they had set up lawn chairs where the living room was to be. "We're sitting in our living room right

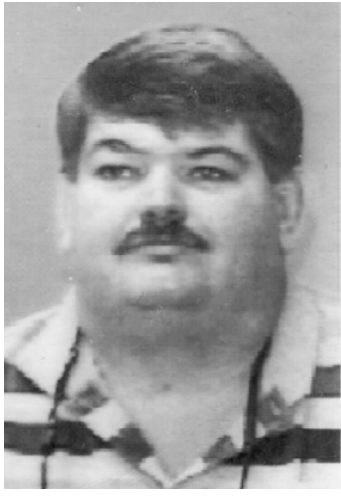
**MARGIE (NUNEZ) MAZZUCCO**

# Parents urged to apply for free or reduced lunches

Property insurance for Cameron Parish School Board buildings will cost \$153,000 less than last year. M. B. Slocum, the Board's insurance consultant, presented a package totaling \$627,146, using four different carriers, at Monday afternoon's regular board meeting.

Slocum said the reduction is due to a softening of the market, more competition, and two years without a major hurricane in the U. S. One feature of the package is a separate \$5000 deductible for computer equipment. The deductible for buildings is \$100,000.

Slocum said that last year Cameron Parish was the only coastal school board to have full coverage on all its properties, and this year it will have full coverage also. The package does not include flood insurance, which is purchased separately.

The board learned that the school lunch program will have a \$197,000 shortfall this year, due to fewer students eligible for free and reduced lunches, less revenue at 4-day schools, and staff salary equalization for the 5-day schools.

**S u p e r i n t e n d e n t** Stephanie Rodrigue said it is very important that parents apply for free and reduced lunches, even if they don't think they qualify, because eligibility for the Title I federal grant program depends on the percent of eligible students. "Title I brings dollars for computers and other programs if enough students qualify," she said. "Right now all our schools are at 75% or more." After the storm, nearly all Cameron Parish students qualified, due to displacement, but more families are getting back into homes, reducing the numbers.

The 2008-09 school calendars were accepted, with all schools opening on the same date, Aug. 11. Four day schools will start at 7:50 a.m. and end at 3:47 p.m., with 25 minute lunch periods, to provide the required number of classroom minutes.

An earlier start date, Aug. 4, had been considered to allow shorter school days, but parent concerns prevailed. Shorter, 20 minute, lunch periods were also considered, but board members objected.

### LAND ISSUES

The Board tabled final approval of a land swap with the Police Jury, pending clarification of mineral rights and right of way issues.

Also tabled was a proposal from Manti Operating Company for a surface and pipeline lease across a school section in the Lacassine Refuge. District Attorney Cecil Sanner was given authority to negotiate for the Board.

Sanner was also authorized, following an executive session, to make a counteroffer to the Army Corps of Engineers to sell a right-of-way easement for 25 years at \$25,000. The Corps' first offer had been \$5,600 for the easement, which it needs for a levee which was built in the wrong place, on School Board land adjacent to the Sabine Refuge.

### EXECUTIVE SESSION

Also after the executive session, the board extended advanced costs from \$100,000 to \$200,000 to vendors and consultants contracted through the Board's lawyers in their litigation against RSUI, wind insurance providers at the time of Hurricane Rita, and upheld the school district's decision on a student management issue.

### ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES

Rodrigue presented a draft of new cash management procedures and revised financial report forms. She hopes to purchase a new accounting program which will allow for more detail to be shown to board members. As an example of the need, the payroll system is still on a DOS based program, ancient by current computer standards. Updated software will allow the accounting department to keep better track of a number of things, including accrued leave time, she said.

A new maintenance employee plan was also adopted, allowing the hiring for two maintenance employees instead of the current one. Under the new plan, each new employee will be responsible for two schools. Tommy Theriot was hired to take care of South Cameron and Johnson Bayou Schools, and James Doxey will cover Grand Lake and Hackberry Schools.

Each new maintenance employee will have a large and a smaller school, and each will work outside their home area to prevent any appearance of taking time off for personal business.

Rodrigue wants to have more work done in-house, with less out-sourcing, to save money for the Board.

newly black-topped parking lot, and a hard surfaced half-mile walking trail leading to Calcasieu Lake.

The Blue Crab recreation area, formerly known as 1A/1B, has a refurbished parking lot. The West Cove recreation area includes refurbished fishing and crabbing piers, boat launches, new hunt kiosks, and newly black-topped parking lots.

On March 19, the refuge requests that all guests park in the south parking lot of the West Cove recreation area and walk across the road to the tent set up at the Wetland Walkway.

The Creole Nature Trail

All-American Road, one of only 38 designated All-American Roads and the only one in the Gulf South, was created in 1979 to stimulate economic development and tourism in the parishes traversed by the trail and to preserve the natural, cultural, scenic, recreational, historical and archaeological qualities of the trail, its people and ecology.

## Beef Cattle disease meeting set

The LSU AgCenter will sponsor a meeting on Monday, March 17, at 7 p.m. The meeting will be to discuss Anaplasmosis in Beef Cattle. The meeting will be held at the Calcasieu Extension Office, 7101 Gulf Highway located by the Burton Coliseum.

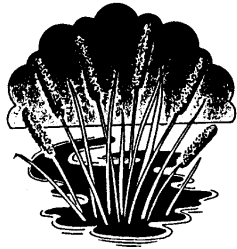
Anaplasmosis is an infectious disease of cattle, causing destruction of the red blood cells. The disease is caused by a minute parasite, Anaplasma marginale, found in the red blood cells of infected cattle.

It may be transmitted from infected animals to healthy animals by insects or surgical instruments. After the organism gains entry into a susceptible animal, the anaplasma parasite slowly reproduces in the animal's blood.

During an incubation period of 4 to 6 weeks, the animal remains healthy and shows no signs of being infected. Finally, after the parasite has reproduced many times and established itself in the red blood cells of the animal, the body attempts to destroy the parasite.

In doing so, the animal's defense system also destroys the infected red blood cells. The loss of a substantial number of red blood cells results in clinical anemia being observed in the infected animal. Anaplasmosis outbreaks are related to lack of a control program.

## It Seems Just Like Yesterday

**Cameron Pilot, March 6, 1975 WHERE ARE THE "LAKES"?**

Where are Big Lake, Grand Lake and Sweetlake?

The Louisiana Department of Highways and the Cameron Police Jury are both confused about the matter.

The police jury was read a letter Monday from R. M. Flanagan, district traffic engineer, stating that the highway department had received some complaints about inconsistencies in highway signs related to the three areas.

"Upon investigation it is evident that there is controversial opinion of the geographical identification of these communities," Mr. Flanagan wrote.

The highway department asked the jury to furnish it with a map locating the three communities so the highway signs could be redone.

However, in discussing the matter the jurors weren't too sure as to the exact location either. Big Lake apparently refers to the old settlement on Calcasieu Lake, but in recent years the area has been shown on the map as Grand Lake. Grand Lake is also the name of the school.

Sweetlake is located to the east of the Grand Lake area but doesn't seem to have any definite boundaries.

To further confuse the matter, Grand Lake is the name of the large lake in the eastern part of the parish near the Vermilion line and Calcasieu Lake, the large lake in the center of the parish, is often called Big Lake by residents.

Evidence that the community on Calcasieu Lake has been known as both Big Lake and Grand Lake for many years is the following item from the "50 Years Ago" column of the American Press quoting a story in the Feb. 28, 1925, issue:

Grand Lake is a delightful summer resort on the north banks of the Calcasieu Lake in the upper portion of Cameron Parish.

It is situated on the east side of the Calcasieu River and is reached from Lake Charles by means of a modern highway that forms a section of State Route No. 42 from Shreveport south to the town of Cameron.

Such a splendid location is Grand Lake for summer homes and bathing trips that the police jury a number of years ago built the Grand Lake Road to the Cameron Parish line and there private individuals took up the work and finished it on into the little summer village.

A toll gate was placed at its north end and when the receipts had paid the cost of construction the road was given to the parish of Cameron.

**Cameron Pilot, March 13, 1975 BOARD GETS TOUGH WITH OIL COMPANIES**

The Cameron Parish School Board has adopted a "get tough" policy with firms that hold mineral leases on

school-owned property and who have refused to explore for oil and gas.

The board made a "demand" on the Exxon Oil Co. Monday either to drill on School Section 16-12-16, on which the company has held a lease since 1939, or to give up the lease so that the board may offer it to other companies.

The school board recently took the same attitude toward another lease--Burton-Sutton Oil Co., which had not drilled in years. However, this company has now begun drilling so as to keep its lease.

### SCHOOL BOARD BUSINESS

A new supervisor's position has been created by the Cameron Parish School Board which is seeking applications for the job.

Supt. U. W. Dickerson said that the new supervisor will be in charge of dealing with the various federal programs under which parish schools now receive much funding.

Mrs. Judy Fruge was hired by the board to do clerical work in the school board office. She will be paid with Federal Manpower Funds.

The retirement of three veteran teachers at the end of the present school term was announced. Mrs. Georgialene Arceneaux, 32 years service, is retiring at Cameron Elementary; Mrs. Archie Berwick, 39 years, will retire at Johnson Bayou; Mrs. Lucille Domingue, South Cameron Elementary, is retiring after 36 years.

A new vocational agriculture department will be created in Cameron Parish next school year and two present industrial arts departments will be closed.

It was felt that the new vocational-technical school that is to be open at the old Audrey School site by the State Board of Education will fill the need for industrial arts subjects in this area.

In addition, the present industrial arts teacher at South Cameron, Leslie Griffith, will become the director of the new vocational school.

### BUS PURCHASED BY BOARD

The purchase of a new bus to transport Cameron Parish students to McNeese and Sowela Tech was accomplished by the Cameron Police Jury Monday.

Henderson Ford, Inc., of Lake Charles, was the successful bidder on the bus with a bid of \$11,182.14.

The board also agreed to advertise for bids for a 50-passenger athletic-activity bus for South Cameron High School.

Coach Baron Thomas presented the board with some specifications for the bus, excluding because of the cost, air conditioning and reclining seats, which the school had originally wanted.

A new water program for the east portion of Ward 3 is under construction by Water District No. 7 and Ward 3 Police Juror Norman McCall.

The water board members, Fredman Theriot, Floyd Baccigallopi, J. Berton Daigle, Raymond LeBlanc and Telesmar Bonsall and Mrs. McCall have issued the following report to the residents of the ward from Jim Daigle's corner to the east end of Ward 3:

"We have created a new water district, which is composed of all of Ward 3 except

the area west of Jim's Daigle's corner."

The Service already provides many public use opportunities. However, working with others, the Service will refocus current programs or design new programs to increase opportunities for all Americans, especially children, to forge a connection with nature. now," they said, "and it looks wonderful."

Two months later, representatives of the Council on Aging, Cameron Community Action, FaithShare Ministry, Volunteers of America, Americorps, and Headstart gathered with a host of family and friends to dedicate the new home. The two bedroom, one bath house is not completely ready to occupy - power, sewer, and furniture were not yet in place, but it already felt like home with gifts from well-wishers overflowing.

MDS Project Manager Carl Duby said everything just came together for the project. The week the foundation was to be laid, he had a group of 18 volunteers from Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, which included a concrete contractor and pro-

fessional mason. The 24 yards of concrete were wheel barrowed into the site and the foundation was completed in four days.

Volunteers from Ohio, Pennsylvania, Illinois, and Ontario, Canada, were on hand for the dedication. One volunteer was Ann Pasnick, of the Lombard, Ill., Mennonite Church who presented the Hebert's with a special handmade quilt. It was the last one her mother made before she died, Pasnick said. A quilted wall hanging made by Jane Hess of Sisterlink, a ladies quilting group in Lancaster, Penn., was also presented.

The Hebert home was the second Mennonite house to be dedicated this year. Two more are to be dedicated in Johnson Bayou this month. Last year, Mennonite Disaster Services built six houses, bringing their total to 10 new homes for Cameron Parish families.

## 4-H Clubs centennial topic of PBS documentary

A half-hour TV documentary, "Louisiana's Lucky Clover: A Century of 4-H" was broadcast on Louisiana Public Broadcasting (LPB) and its statewide PBS affiliates Wednesday, March 12 at 7:40 p.m.

Produced by the LSU AgCenter, the documentary tracks the formation and development of this youth organization from the first "corn club" in Avoyelles Parish in 1908 to today's vast network of clubs and projects across that state that involved about 225,000 young people in 2007, according to Paul Coreil, vice chancellor and director of the Louisiana Cooperative Extension service.

"4-H is the largest youth organization in the country," Coreil said. "And Louisiana was one of the first states to recognize the potential."

The documentary uses rare photographs and film footage to guide viewers through the history, which includes many stories people

today may not realize, said Mark Tassin, director of the LSU Ag Center 4-H and youth development program.

For example, during World War II young club members raised \$3.5 million in war bonds, enough for the military to build a cargo ship, or liberty ship as they were called. The ship was named the "Floyd W. Spencer" in memory of a popular Louisiana 4-H agent.

This documentary includes clips from interviews with more than 30 people, said Randy LaBauve, LSU AgCenter communications specialist and the documentary's producer. Among those featured are Lt. General Russel Honore', East Baton Rouge Parish Mayor-President Kip Holden and Leonard Knapp Jr., grandson of Seaman Knapp, one of the founders of the nationwide Cooperative Extension Service.

LaBauve will also be making arrangements for the documentary to air on other Louisiana stations during the course of the year. DVD copies of the documentary will be made available for sale later this year with the opening of the 4-H Museum in Mansura, which is in Avoyelles Parish. Proceeds from the sale will go to the Louisiana 4-H Foundation, Coreil said. The program will be rebroadcast on LPB Sunday, March 16 at 12:30 p.m.
