Paul Coreil named to nat'l post

Paul Coreil, vice chancellor of the LSU AgCenter and director of the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, has been named to the newly created Farm Bill Implementation Assistance Committee. He is one of 11 agricultural leaders across the country, and the only person from Louisiana, named to this committee, which will recommend policies for enactment of the new federal Farm Bill.

Coreil's special concerns are assuring stability of U. S. Department of Agriculture capacity funding for the LSU AgCenter and getting funds to help the development of the specialty crop industry in Louisiana.

This is the first time the Farm Bill has included provisions for specialty crops - pecans, sweet potatoes, citrus and horticulture, among others - all part of Louisiana's diverse agricultural industry.

Dr. Coreil is well known in Cameron Parish as he served as the Extension Service wildlife and fisheries agent in the parish for a number of years. During that time, he and his family lived in Grand Chenier.

Boustany announces \$1,000,000 grant

U. S. Rep. Charles W. Boustany has announced a FEMA grant of \$1,092,902 to build a warehouse for Cameron Parish school use at the old Audrey Memorial school site. The building will replace the old Audrey School building which was used as a warehouse prior to its destruction by Hurricane Rita.

"As the people of Cameron Parish continue to rebuild, ensuring the school system has the necessary resources is one of the most important aspects," Boustany said. "I am really proud of the ongoing hard work by Cameron Parish schools and families across the area."

On Sept. 23, 2005, severe storm activity, including a storm surge of 15 to 20 feet from Hurricane Rita, resulted in the severe damage to Cameron Parish public buildings and facilities. Formerly

Audrey Memorial School consisting of three classroom buildings built in 1958 and an adjacent gymnasium were converted to warehouse/storage facilities supporting all schools in the parish and a bus garage for maintenance and repair of all the Cameron Parish School Board's vehicles. Flood waters rose to 18 feet above grade completely submerging the parish buildings for weeks. The only structure left standing after the storm was the steel frame and damaged roof of the bus garage.

Stephanie Rodrigue, Cameron Parish Superintendent of Schools, said, "we are pleased our recovery projects are moving through the FEMA process, and we look forward to rebuilding as soon as construction begins on South Cameron High School."

School Board bldg. contract is awarded

The contract for the new Cameron Parish School Board Administration Building in Cameron was awarded to Priola Construction Company on a low bid of \$5,494,895 during the Board's regular monthly meeting Monday afternoon.

The contract included some items that may not be covered by FEMA funding, including roll-down hurricane shutters, a generator, a security system, and possible costs for elevation above the base flood elevation.

Kisha Kilmer, of the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, reported that the project has been approved for actual cost funding since it is a change of location, not an improved project.

The generator and security system were not part of the original building, and therefore not eligible for FEMA funding, but there are other sources of funds such as Community Development Block Grants designed specifically to address items not covered by FEMA, she said. The shutters are part of the Stafford Act, so she suggested the Board pursue FEMA funding, but go ahead and install them anyway.

The elevation issue stems from the state-mandated International Building Code that required the engineers to design the structure for 17.2 feet above sea level, even though the ABFE is currently 12.5 feet. FEMA will only pay for elevation to current BFE at the time of construction. The cost of the additional elevation will be \$30,000 per foot, for a total of \$120,000, which School Board member Dot Theriot said is well worth the cost.

However, if the new DFIRM flood maps are adopted by the parish before construction begins, the building will be only 9 inches above BFE, and the cost will be negligible. Kilmer said it is possible for the parish to adopt the DFIRM elevations for isolated areas of the parish such as the building site, to qualify it for FEMA reimbursement, even while appealing the maps in other areas.

The cost of concrete slab demolition at the former Cameron Library site will hopefully be covered by a new Project Worksheet to be written by the Police Jury. The library was on School

Broussard, 16, of Grand Lake died. Snider was the driver of the vehicle in which Broussard was a passenger in the one-vehicle accident.

No true bills of indictment were returned against any person in the death of Derek Thibodeaux, of Creole, who died in a 4-wheeler accident on Trosclair Road in Cameron on Oct. 20, 2007.

Library gets grant for building design

The Cameron Parish Library has received a grant of \$80,784 for consulting and professional fees to design the Cameron main library branch. The grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation is administered by SOLINET.

"The Gulf Coast Library Project is pleased to award Cameron Parish a planning grant for architectural services for the rebuilding of the Cameron Branch Library. Cameron Parish Library was the first to open temporary libraries after the storms and

we are confident they will be one of the first to rebuild a permanent library," said MaryEllin Santiago, manager of the project.

"The staff, director and library board of Cameron Parish Library should be commended for their dedicated efforts to provide outstanding library service to the citizens of Cameron Parish while working in temporary facilities. The library has hired design consultant Denelle Wrightson to assist architect Gene Sellers with the interior design of the Cameron main branch. Sellers is also designing the Grand Chenier and Johnson Bayou branches. All three branches are eligible for FEMA rebuilding funds.

PILOT bonds cause concern

Public entities planning to use the Cheniere PILOT (payment in lieu of taxes) to repay a proposed bond issue have concerns about the feasibility of the bond, now that Cheniere Energy seems to be in financial straits.

News articles in the May 29 New York Times and the May 30 Houston Chronicle have pointed out that liquefied natural gas, once plentiful and cheap overseas, has now become expensive and in demand by European and Asian markets, thus making it very difficult for U S LNG importers to purchase cargoes at a profitable price.

The American natural gas market has not kept up with worldwide demand, thanks in part to unexpected events in Japan, the increasing affluence of Third World countries, and the increase in oil prices which is making natural gas fired power plants more attractive. Some observers think U S natural gas prices will rise to a level competitive with the rest of the world, especially if next winter is very cold.

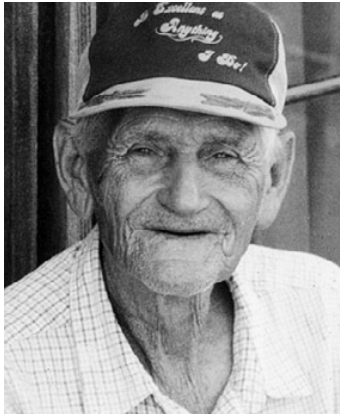
CLARENCE J. "BO CHALK" BOUDREAUX

tiveness of the system. "This is done no where else in Louisiana that I know of," he said. Hackberry School Board member Dwayne Sanner said his local water district doesn't charge any monthly fee for fire water lines on public buildings.

Kilmer also reported on the possibility of changing the South Cameron High School project from improved status to actual cost, based on actions taken in Southeastern Louisiana. More than one school there has been consolidated into a multi-story building, just like South Cameron, but has been given actual cost status. She said she noticed these projects while working in that area, and knew of the different status of South Cameron, so she asked about it.

If the status is changed, FEMA will fund the new building up to actual cost instead of PW estimate, saving the School Board a lot of money. The school project is expected to be bid out next month.

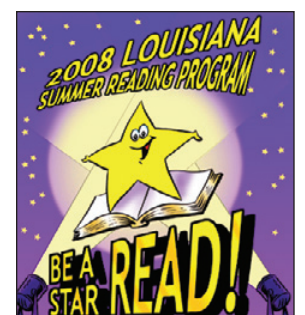

Cameron Pilot, June 12, 1974 SCHOOL BOARD GETS SIZABLE OIL LEASE

The Cameron Parish School Board approved a sizable lease on 300 acres of school land for oil and gas development Monday.

The board leased a portion of Section 16-15-5 to Rudy Vodicka for a bonus of \$45,290, one-half of the amount annually for these three years, plus 27 1/2 percent of all oil and gas produced.

A resolution thanking the school board for allowing the mosquito control district to use the old Audrey Memorial School for offices was presented to the Board by Clifford Myers, district president, and Bruce Cravens, director. The district has now moved its offices to a new multi-purpose building erected by the police jury.

BROTHER JEROME COMES HOME

Brother Jerome Dimas, a native of Cameron Parish, has finally come back home.

Dimas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Dimas of Creole, has been gone from the area for 12 years while he has been studying for the priesthood.

He was ordained a deacon in the Catholic Church on May 17, in the National Shrine of Our Lady of LaSalette in Ipswich, Mass.

Dimas went to the 8th grade in Cameron school and received the remainder of his education in the Catholic Seminary at Jefferson City, Missouri and Catholic University, Washington, D.C.

He became interested in the LaSalette Brothers order of the Catholic Church because of the influence of Father Anthony Bruzas, who served as a pastor for some time in Creole, the church which Dimas attended at the time.

Dimas said that the Missionary Order originated in France and the closet church that it serves to his native Cameron Parish is in Sulphur.

In order to be as close to home as possible he is now serving as a deacon at our Lady of Prompt Succor in Sulphur and will be there a year and will be ordained a priest next spring.

Dimas officiated at a wedding in the Sacred Heart Church in Creole Saturday.

ALLIGATOR SEASON EXPECTED

Federal bans against the harvest of alligators in Calcasieu, Cameron and Vermilion parishes are expected to be lifted, possibly as early as August, and state wildlife officials say it is possible

a controlled season could be held in the three parishes early this fall.

A spokesman for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington confirmed Friday that revised regulations governing the alligator are expected to be published in the Federal Register later this month.

Barring unforeseen problems, the revisions could become effective early in August and a season held under state supervision before gators begin their winter hibernation this fall.

Controlled harvests by the state were halted last year when the alligator was placed on the federal endangered species list. State officials have sought revisions in that status on the grounds that the state's alligator population is so large for controls.

The revisions would remove the alligator from the endangered species list in Cameron, Calcasieu and Vermilion parishes.

John Paul Crain, veteran observer of alligator activities in Cameron Parish, said he felt gator skins would bring from \$6 to \$10 a foot since they cannot be shipped to Europe, where processing costs are lower than the U. S.

In 1973, trappers took 2,908 alligators and the hides netted \$271,649. The average price per foot was \$14.

HUNGRY GATORS

Louisiana Wildlife gents were called this week to the rescue of some Johnson Bayou residents who had lost several game ducks and dogs to some hungry alligators.

It seems that the gators came out of the marshes and went into the yards of the Johnson Bayou residents to eat their prey.

The 7 foot gators were moved from the area by the agents back on "Blue Buck" ridge to another marsh where possibly the food is more plentiful.

Area residents are hoping the Federal government will declare an open season on alligators because they know how plentiful they are in Johnson Bayou area.

Flood insurance rate maps can be seen at L. C. center

The public is invited to view newly revised Preliminary Digital Flood Insurance Rate Maps (DFIRMS) for Calcasieu Parish at an open house scheduled for Tuesday, June 24.

The open house will be from 2 to 8 p.m., at the Lake Charles Civic Center, 2nd Floor- Contraband Room, 900 Lakeshore Drive, in Lake Charles.

Specialists will be on hand at the open house to answer citizens' questions and to provide additional information about the flood mapping process, the impact of new flood maps, and the benefits and requirements of flood insurance. Citizens are encouraged to view the maps, which will be available in both digital and paper formats.

New or updated flood maps available at the Open House are for the following areas: City of DeQuincy, Town of Iowa, City of Lake Charles, City of Sulphur, Town of Vinton, City of Westlake, and unincorporated areas of Calcasieu Parish.

Flood Insurance Rate Maps delineate flood-risk zones and serve as an integral part of the National Flood Insurance Program, which plays a key role in defense against flood losses on an individual, community, state and national basis. The preliminary flood maps were developed as part of the nationwide map modernization effort spearheaded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which administers the National Flood Insurance Program.

The new maps will replace the current effective maps, which are outdated and were produced using earlier technology. Also, the new maps are in a digital for-

mat, providing greater detail and making it easier for citizens to view the information.

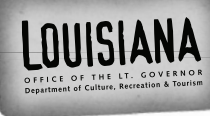
The flood maps will help residents and business owners understand their current flood risk and make more informed decisions about protecting their property. Community planners, local officials, engineers, builders and others will have the tools to make important determinations about where and how new structures and developments should be built to maximize safety.

The release of the maps begins a process of official and public review and comments, ultimately resulting in the adoption of the new digital flood maps. While adoption is voluntary, it is a requirement for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program.

Residents should consult their local floodplain administrator with questions on what flood map or elevations to use during the rebuilding process. Extensive information about the Louisiana Mapping Project and the map adoption process is available online at www.lamappingproject.com.

Iles relates experience on African mission trip

(EDITOR'S NOTE -- Curt and DeDe Iles of Dry Creek are on a mission trip to Africa. He is the former manager of the Dry Creek Baptist Encampment and is the author of numerous books on Southwest Louisiana. The following is an e-mail report on their first week in Africa.)

My favorite thing has been how the AIDs orphans call me, "Baba." It means "Father" in Zulu. Cibo, nearly three, was found wandering the streets a year ago and came to live at Tabitha ministries. He was completely undisciplined and antisocial. However, good things have happened in his life.

When our team went to tuck in the boys, Cibo took my hand. As I put him in bed, he whispered, "Baba, I want you to kiss me." It was one of the joys of my life to pass this love on to him.

Because AIDS is such a killer in the Sweetwaters area, many babies are born HIV positive. This has led to many babies being discarded at birth. Tabitha ministries has placed a baby crib at a key place in the community for newborns to be left. Please pray that the doorbell will ring on Zandele's porch and she will find a precious baby left there.

Our team, especially Chris Greene, has spent a lot of time at the Zhake Agriculture school for Zulu boys. Our new African friend Richard and his staff are teaching skills as well as leading many of the boys to personal faith in Jesus.

The students, in true African style replete with kicking and dancing, sang, "When I remember what the Lord has done, I will never go back anymore. No, No, No, I will never go back anymore." To see 130 young men singing this moved us beyond words.

As these boys are taught farming skills and grown spiritually, they will return to their farms and villages scattered throughout the Zulu kingdom.

Our favorite Zulu names: A caring woman named "Pretty" in Zulu. Cibo, nearly three, was found wandering the streets a year ago and came to live at Tabitha ministries. He was completely undisciplined and antisocial. However, good things have happened in his life.

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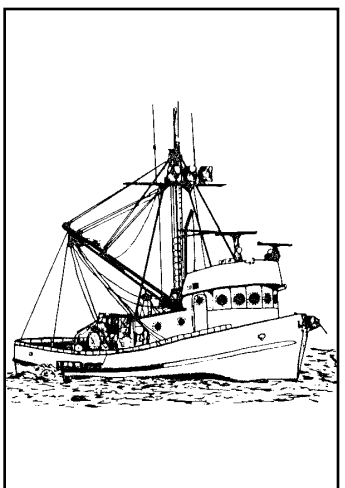
Shrimping meeting set

The Redfish/Speckle Trout shootout, sponsored by the Evans P. Mhire Knights of Columbus and St. Eugene Church had a nice turn out at the park, with plenty to eat and lots of good music. This was the 3rd annual Family Fun Day.

There were 29 boats entered in the shootout, but no one caught or weighed in a Speckle Trout. Getting out of the Grand Chenier Jetties into the Gulf was really rough.

Kenneth Nunez Jr. had a 28.64 Redfish to take first place and \$500 cash prize. Second place went to Michell Welsh with 17.44 pounds. Jimmy Pierce took third place with a 13.72 Redfish.

The Coastal Conservation Association Trout Shootout last Saturday, with weigh in at Calcasieu Point Landing was won by Mr. Midkalf, with a 5.14 Speckle Trout. I'll try to have more next week.

BIG LAKE AREA

The Big Lake area is still strong on trout and strong on wind. There's lots of small trout hitting shrimp under the birds, but with shrimping season starting, there will be some scattering of the trout, but this is when the bank fishing and oysterreefs pay off.

Lacassine Refuge pool fishing is tough, as water is really low if you get out of the trails. Using plastics,

like a topwater pattern is really best in the shallows using no weights, floating frogs and the Zoom Flukes do work.

BIG BURN

The Big Burn is about the same, areas low on water, but fishing the canals has been paying off. Again plastics, but if your fishing the canals, it pays to use a 1/8 bullet weight, but don't forget the old reliable spinner bait. I like the Knipps Red Massicon or baby bass colors in 1/8 or 1/4 ounce with a bronze willow leaf blade. Fishing the cuts, you can't beat the beetlespin in 1/4 ounce with a black/yellow strip, with a red dot in the middle.

GIBBSTOWN TOURNAMENT

Justin and Johnny LeDoux had a first place stinger, weighing 6.21 pounds, and they also had the Big Bass, weighing 3.05 pounds. Darren and Barry Richard took second place with 4.77 pounds, while third place went to Cody Benton and Trey Wilkerson with 4.4 pounds.

(In some cases, this requirement may be waived. Check with the local Parish Office.)

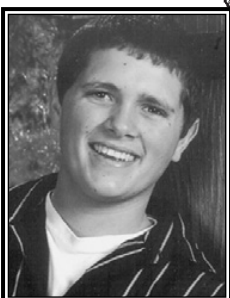

Right now, Cheniere and other U S LNG companies are finding it hard to buy shipments, just as the boom in LNG terminal construction is nearing completion. Cheniere's stock prices have dropped from around \$40 last fall to near \$5 recently, and some industry observers are speculating about bankruptcy.

While Cheniere denies bankruptcy rumors, claiming confidence that cargoes will become available this summer, local entities which had counted on the PILOT program to fund hurricane rebuilding efforts are left wondering where they stand.

A meeting was scheduled with participating agencies for Thursday, June 12, but it was cancelled. The possible effect of Cheniere's troubles on the parish is unclear at this time, and may vary from one agency to another.

The Police Jury, Sheriff's Office, Library, Mosquito Control, and various water, ambulance, and fire districts which include Cheniere in their taxing districts, and were counting on the bond issue, are most concerned. They would likely be responsible for bond repayment if Cheniere should go bankrupt.

The School Board chose to take annual payments instead of joining the bond issue, and had earmarked the funds for various improvements over the next ten years.

Policies may change for upcoming school year

"Parents need to know that the bar will be raised tremendously" if proposed changes to the Student Code of Conduct and Interscholastic Athletics policies of the Cameron Parish School Board are adopted, said Superintendent Stephanie Rodrigue on Monday.

Changes, resulting from meetings with all parish school administrators, include swift penalties for carrying illegal items (drugs, CDS, firearms) to school, even if in a locked vehicle. Vehicle searches conducted during the past year turned up numerous instances of drugs (mostly over-the-counter but some controlled dangerous substances and prescription drugs) and at least one firearm. School Board members favored adding alcohol to the list.

The code changes will make suspension mandatory in these cases, followed by an investigation. If the investigation reveals that a firearm or other weapon was not in the locked vehicle with "intention to harm," suspension would be lifted.

In the past, vehicle searches were followed by an investigation and then suspension if warranted. Under the new rules, the suspension would be immediate, even in the case of a parent's prescription drugs left in a vehicle. Investigation would follow, determining final outcome.

Board member Loston McEvers was concerned about students suffering for their parents' mistakes, but Dot Theriot said these new guidelines would "make parents responsible" for items in their vehicle, if it is brought to school.

Any such illegal items found in the student's possession or otherwise accessible at school would result in expulsion.

The Interscholastic Athletics policy would be changed to specify that a student recommended for suspension would be barred from athletic events immediately after the investigation, with no delay for participation in a specific event.

Changes in the cell phone policy were discussed, which seems to happen annually. The latest tweaking of the rules changes the current ban from "possession" of a cell phone to "physically visible," from arrival on campus to the last bell. These changes will allow students staying after school for extra-curricular activities to call home for a ride after school hours.

Students will still not be able to use the phones during school hours for any reason except school emergencies. If a phone is seen, it will be confiscated.

The penalties for possessing or using laser pointers are to be revised, with expulsion and notification of authorities recommended if an injury results from use.

Details and other changes can be obtained from the School Board office. The Board will vote on them next month.

PERSONNEL CHANGES

Hackberry High School's new principal will be Brenda Sanders, formerly assistant principal at Johnson Bayou High School. Sanders replaces Austin LaBove, who retired at the end of the school year.

New assistant principals have been named for both schools. Carl Langley for Hackberry and Robert Kimble for Johnson Bayou. Gene Reynolds will remain as principal at Johnson Bayou, as Hayes "Pete" Picou, who has been on medical sabbatical for the past year, will be retiring from that position on Oct. 1.

Kelly Huffer has been hired as School Registered Nurse for Grand Lake and South Cameron High Schools. An appointee for Hackberry and Johnson Bayou is expected by the end of June. Ashley Granger had been named School LPN for Grand Lake.

Art Education for regular students will be available at all schools in the coming school year. Frances Fazio and Erin Canik have been appointed to teach art at Hackberry/Johnson Bayou and Grand Lake/South Cameron, respectively.

Many other positions have been filled by appointment and/or transfer, and more are to be advertised. The Board is seeking to hire Alternative Education teachers for suspended and expelled students, one on each side of the parish. When there are no such students to teach, Alternative Teachers will serve as in-house substitutes or remediation teachers.

OTHER BUSINESS

The School Board will be seeking an independent auditing firm, since the current contract with Little and Associates, of Monroe, is expiring. Board member Karen Nunez asked that the new auditor be familiar with school issues and willing to work with new staff. One with SWLA experience was preferred.

The Board voted to buy a handicapped accessible bus for the Johnson Bayou area, based on the enrollment of a handicapped student for the fall term. Rodrigue pointed out that it would be less expensive to buy a \$60,000 bus that can transport all children than to buy a handicapped-only bus and hire a driver for one student. The new air-conditioned bus can be used for field trips as well, transporting all students.

"This can be a model for future bus replacement," Rodrigue said.

Building Codes and Permits Section 101. Definitions.

Cameron Parish Building Official shall mean that employee or individual appointed by the Cameron Parish Police Jury to serve as the building official for Cameron Parish and to serve as building codes enforcement officer for Cameron Parish.

Section 102. Adoption of State Uniform Construction Code.

Pursuant to La. R.S. 40:1730.21 et seq., the following codes are hereby adopted as the regulations governing the construction of buildings and other structures in Cameron Parish. Unless specified, all standards contained in a referenced code are adopted and included for purposes of this article. Unless referenced by name or letter designation, no appendix or appendices to a code is adopted.

- (1) International Building Code, 2006 Edition, not including Chapter 27-Electrical and Chapter 29-Plumbing Systems;
- (2) International Existing Building Code, 2006 Edition;
- (3) International Residential Code, including Parts I-Administrative, and V Mechanical as published by the International Code Council;
- (4) International Electric Code, 2005 Edition;
- (5) Louisiana Plumbing Code, 2000 Edition.

Section 103. Permits.

It shall be unlawful to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or change any building or structure or change the occupancy of any building or structure, or to erect, install, enlarge, alter, repair, remove, convert or replace any electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system, the installation of which is regulated by the technical codes adopted in Section 102, or to cause any such work to be done, without obtaining a properly issued construction permit from the Cameron Parish Building Official for said work.

Section 104. Applications for permit.

The permit mandated under Section 103 shall only be issued after the owner or his designee has submitted an application for a construction permit to the Cameron Parish Building Official and that official has approved the application for permit. The application shall, at a minimum, include the following information:

- (1) Name, address, and daytime telephone number of owner;
- (2) Name, address, and daytime telephone number of any and all contractors;
- (3) Location of the construction;
- (4) Description of the construction, including but not limited to square footage, type of construction, intended occupancy, and whether any work will involve following types;
 - (a) Electrical,
 - (b) Concrete or masonry,
 - (c) Plumbing,
 - (d) Structural, and
 - (e) Natural gas, liquefied gas, or other gas fuel.
- (5) Anticipated completion of construction; and
- (6) Certification, under penalty or perjury, that the construction will be done in compliance with the applicable codes and standards.

Section 105. Certification of compliance.

It shall be unlawful for any structure or other construction which is required to be permitted under Section 103 to be occupied, used, or otherwise put in service before the owner or his designee has filed a certificate of completion and compliance on the form provided by the Cameron Parish Building Official. The certificate of completion and compliance shall include the following information:

- (1) Name, address, and daytime telephone number of owner;
- (2) Name, address, and daytime telephone number of any and all contractors;
- (3) Location of the construction;
- (4) Description of the construction, including but not limited to square footage, type of construction, and intended occupancy;
- (5) Date of construction; and
- (6) Certification, under penalty or perjury, that the construction was done in compliance with the applicable codes and standards.

Section 106. Enforcement of construction code.

After Notice is given as provided in Section 110, the Building Official of Cameron Parish may, through the District Attorney, (1) seek to enjoin further construction of work which is required to be permitted under this chapter and which construction or work does not have a validly issued permit or is not in compliance with a validly issued permit; and/or (2) seek to enjoin the occupancy or use of any building or structure which has, without compliance with this chapter, been, in whole or in part, constructed, enlarged, altered, repaired, moved, demolished, or the occupancy changed or for which the electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system has been erected, installed, enlarged, altered, repaired, removed, converted or replaced in any fashion.

Section 107. Building officials.

There shall be a Cameron Parish Building Official who shall be the parish building code enforcement officer responsible for the administration and enforcement of the Louisiana State Uniform Construction code

and this Ordinance.

Section 108. Penalties.

Any person, partnership, or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this chapter or aids or abets in the violation of any of the provisions of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00), nor less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense.

Section 109. Building official.

Pursuant to La. R.S. 40:1730.25, LAC 55:VI, and this chapter of the Cameron Parish Code of Ordinances, a building official is hereby appointed and confirmed for Cameron Parish.

Section 110. Notice.

A Notice

1. Notice shall be served by one of the following methods:

a. Notice is served by posting a "NOTICE: STOP WORK ORDER" on the building or structure which is in violation of this Ordinance.

b. Notice is served by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, sent to the actual address or last known address listed on the tax rolls of the parish.

c. Notice is served in the same manner as service of citation or other process upon any mortgagee or any other person who may have a vested or contingent interest in the premises as indicated in the mortgage or other public records of the parish, if the owner is absent or is unable to be served in accordance with the first two (2) paragraphs of this subsection.

d. Notice is made by publication once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks in the official parish journal if the owner is absent or is unable to be served in accordance with the first three paragraphs of this subsection.

2. In the event Notice is mailed, Notice may be served to one of the following responsible parties:

- a. The owner of the premises. **Owner's** shall mean the person listed as owner of the premises in questions on the current parish property tax rolls, and the address shall be the last address shown on said rolls
- b. The occupant of the premises. **Occupant** shall mean anyone residing on the premises in questions.
- c. The owner's representative. **Owner's representative** shall mean the general agent, architect, contractor, or any other person who commits the violation. Owner's representative may be served orders or notices in lieu of serving the owner or occupant.

B. Procedure for abatement. Notice from the Building Official shall outline the conditions of abatement, which shall include but not be limited to the violation, the action needed to remedy violation and the time limit for complying with this Ordinance and/or correcting the violation.

Section 111. Severability.

This Chapter and each Section, subsection and provision of said chapter there under, are hereby declared to be independent divisions and subdivisions and, notwithstanding any other evidence of legislative intent, it is hereby declared to be the controlling legislative intent that if any provisions of this chapter, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, the remaining sections or provisions and the application of such sections and provisions to any person or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid, shall not be affected thereby, and it is hereby declared that such sections and provisions are severable and would have passed independently of such section or provision so known to be invalid.

CHAPTER THREE
ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Sec. 3-36. Prohibited acts of retail permittees.

(a) Sell or serve alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years, unless such person submits a driver's license, selective service card or other lawful identification which, on its face, establishes the age of the person as twenty-one (21) years or older and there is no reason to doubt the authenticity or correctness of the identification.

Consequently, the filing indicates that the Company requires an annual FRP rider revenue increase of approximately \$1.3 million dollars, reflecting: (1) an increase of approximately \$5.4 million annually related to the EROE deficiency; and (2) a decrease of approximately \$4.1 million annually pursuant to FRP Section 3.D to reflect an increase in additional capacity costs.

Based upon the May billed fuel adjustment, this prospective rate increase would have the following effects: A typical bill for Residential Service for 1,000 kWh would increase \$0.11 from \$108.89 to \$109.00. Cameron Parish library is pleased to announce the addition of three databases to its already extensive database collection. *For Students Online*, *Scribner Writers Series* and *Twayne's Authors* are geared toward literary research and are especially useful for secondary students as well as the general public.

Louisiana tomatoes are safe

Louisiana Agriculture and Forestry Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M. said the U. S. Food and Drug Administration has placed Louisiana-grown tomatoes on their approved safe to buy and eat list.

"Louisiana tomatoes are at peak season right now but the big supermarket chains were refusing to buy them from our state growers because of a *Salmonella* outbreak in New Mexico and Texas," Strain said. "I asked the FDA to include us on the list of safe states to buy and eat locally grown tomatoes and they responded promptly."

Strain said the U. S. Food and Drug Administration issued warnings last week to consumers in New Mexico and Texas about the risk of contracting *Salmonellosis* from eating certain types of raw red tomatoes.

"There have been no reports in Louisiana of anyone getting sick from eating Louisiana tomatoes," Strain said. "We're just really glad for our growers that the FDA approved us so quickly."

The gross farm value of Louisiana tomatoes is more than \$12.5 million, Strain added.
