## LNG terminal work to begin in July

Construction on the new Cameron LNG terminal on the Calcasieu Ship Channel is scheduled to begin in late July, said Mark Nelson of Sempra LNG.

Nelson and Joe Risse, both with San Diego-based Sempra, spoke Tuesday at the Propeller Club meeting in Lake Charles.

The \$700 million project includes a turning basin, docks, storage tanks, and pipelines off the ship channel about 15 miles north of Lake Charles.

Sempra, a Fortune 500 company, employs 13,000 people worldwide, Nelson said.

## Port Arthur LNG permit is sought

Port Arthur LNG has applied for Coastal Use Permits to construct an LNG terminal at Port Arthur, Texas and a 70-mile pipeline for distribution of natural gas through Calcasieu, Cameron and Beauregard Parishes.

The line will proceed from the terminal in a northeasterly route that enters into Sabine Lake. It will intersect the northern bank of Sabine Lake on the Texas side. The line will cross the Sabine River into Louisiana, where it will run thru the Coastal Zone for approximately 5.7 miles. The line will then make a northward turn and cross the Intra-coastal Waterway. The line will end at a tie-in located in Beauregard Parish.

Starting from the Texas side of the Sabine River, the line will be directionally bored beneath the waterway, within marsh areas, a 125' right of way will be required for construction practices. The line will be buried a minimum of 3' below the marsh surface while temporarily displacing 87,075 cubic yards of native material from excavation activities.

The Cameron LNG project has been fully permitted, he said.

Joe Risse said the company is excited about starting the Cameron facility, which will sit on 283 acres.

It will produce 1.5 billion cubic feet of gas per day when it opens in late 2008, he said.

Construction will take three years and is expected to produce 800 jobs at its peak, Risse said.

The facility will employ 50 permanent workers, he said.

The company has undergone a rigorous permitting procedure, and it received a letter of recommendation from the Coast Guard in May, Risse said.

It will be the first new LNG terminal to be built in North America in more than 20 years, according to Sempra.

The company also plans to build a terminal along the Port Arthur ship channel in Texas.

## Bill debated

The Louisiana House Tuesday rejected Senate amendments to a bill that would allow the Cameron Parish Police Jury to regulate waste storage or incineration facilities through zoning ordinances.

House Bill 249 by Rep. Mickey Frith, D-Abbeville, would allow the parish to regulate where those types of facilities can locate.

The bill will be taken up by a conference committee, which will try to work out a compromise.

## Beach erosion project told

Several agencies recently participated in a project to halt erosion and decrease damage from future hurricanes and tropical storms on Peveto Beach in the western part of Cameron Parish.

Prior to implement of the project erosion was taking place at an alarming rate. In fact 1.7 million yards of sand had to be pumped on the beach prior to the work being done.

The new project consisted of construction of about 19,000 feet (nearly 4 miles) of sand fencing and installation of vegetative plantings.

The fencing traps wind-blown sand, thus building a dune. As the sand builds, the dune grows in height and width which provides a barrier between the waters of the Gulf and strong winds produced by storms.

The primary plant, Bitter

Panicum, used in this restoration project, will spread, cover the dune, and anchor the built-up sand.

Agencies participating in the project were the Imperial Calcasieu RC&D Agency, La. Dept. of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Services, Cameron Parish Police Jury, Gulf of Mexico Foundation, La. Dept. of Natural Resources, and Gulf Coast Soil & Water Conservation District.

## Jail renovations have begun

"Please bear with us" is the request of Sheriff Theos Duhon as renovations to the Cameron Parish jail's antiquated plumbing system begin next week. Office operations will be impacted as the functions of the jail, dispatchers, booking, and interrogation will all be moved out of the almost 70 year old facility.

Duhon asks that all complaints be called in to the office for the duration of the repairs, expected to take six weeks. The dispatchers have been moved upstairs in the court house to the Office of Emergency Preparedness (Civil Defense) offices near the Court Room.

The office is crowded, and during an emergency it will

have to be shared with OEP personnel. At night that portion of the court house is kept locked, so walk-in complaints cannot be taken.

The 25 current inmates of the parish jail are expected to be moved by Sunday to Calcasieu Parish. The 23 male prisoners will be housed at the Calcasieu Sheriff's Office substation near the airport, attended by Cameron Parish jailers.

The two female inmates will be housed at the main correctional facility on Broad Street.

The Calcasieu substation has cells to house 28 inmates, and Sheriff Tony Mancuso has made all of them available to Cameron Parish for the duration of the repairs. Family members of current inmates have all been notified

of the move and the procedures for visitation at the substation.

Only felony arrests and those serving jail time will be sent to Calcasieu Parish. Misdemeanor arrests will be processed at the Records and Investigation Building on Marshall Street.

Sheriff Duhon asks to public to be patient during the moving period as "bugs" are worked out of the systems. Computers, radios, and telephone systems are being re-routed to the temporary locations, and he expects to deal with unforeseen complications as the move progresses.

When the repairs are completed, however, everything will be back to normal, with fully upgraded sanitation facilities in place.

## School cell phones debated

The Cameron Parish School Board wrestled with the thorny issue of cell phones at school during their regular monthly meeting on Monday. Revisions to the Student Code of Conduct policy suggested by a committee of principals and assistant principals included a change from the current cell phone policy which prohibits them completely.

Under the proposal, cell phones would be allowed in students possession, but "unauthorized use" would be prohibited. Uland Guidry, reporting for the committee, said that many students presently carry the phones at school in defiance of the rules, and are only punished when they are caught using them.

The effect would be the same under the new policy, since use would be forbidden during school time, but he said many parents like the security and convenience of their child having a cell phone for after school practices and out of town athletic events.

Guidry quoted an Attorney General's opinion for the 2003-2004 school year which

stated "no student shall use or operate any electronic device in any public elementary, middle or secondary school, on the grounds or on transportation, except in an emergency."

An emergency is defined as a situation causing a threat to life, injury, or severe property damage. Possession, however, is left up to the individual school boards.

Board members Pat Howerton and Dwayne Sanner spoke out against allowing even possession of cell phones in the schools, citing illicit use for text messaging test answers, taking and sending photos from rest rooms and locker rooms, and disruption of classrooms by ringing phones. Sanner said even teachers are using phones in the classroom, and they should be prohibited for all.

Board member Rachel Abadie spoke for the parents

whose children need to call home after practices and games to be picked up, saying if the phones are turned off during school, there would be no disruption. A suggestion that students be allowed to turn in phones to the office on game days and pick them up before the bus leaves was deemed too cumbersome for office staff.

Motions by Howerton and Sanner to keep the old policy of prohibition failed. Language was added, however to require that phones be turned off during the school day, details to be worked out by next month's meeting.

Other proposed changes to the Code of Conduct include stiffening penalties for certain offenses, adding being under the influence of illegal drugs, controlled substances, inhalants, or prescription medication (except with a

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
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

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# Cameron Outdoors

Today, since people live longer, and are able to work in their later years, a set retirement age no longer makes sense. Some new guideline tells us when its time.

They say a publisher should quit when he or she can't handle the "volume" anymore. An actor should tell he or she's done when he can't make the "scene." A dentist will know when he's had his "fill." A photographer better retire when he just doesn't "click" anymore, while an artist has had it when he can "draw" his own conclusions. A teacher should retire if he or she has no "class," and an accountant ought to quit before his "number" comes up.

We all know how expensive it is to fish, all the new modern tackle are high price, and a fisherman should retire when his "net" income is falling off. Now, a writer can go on writing until the "end," so I got to thinking, when the time comes for me to not be able to hunt and fish, maybe I'll still be able to write as a writer writing about hunting and fishing. It may not be the real McCoy, but it'll be right next to it.

It's kind of like taking a grandchild or kid fishing, and they catch a small perch or bream, and you tell them to throw it in, as it has too many bones. After you throw quite a few back in, they'll ask you, are we trying to catch fish without any bones?

### AREA FISHING

I didn't get a chance to wet a line this past week, as I spent two days of tests on the old body, then the emergency room and then three more in the hospital, and then it's taking it easy for another few days. It seems that all the excitement I've had throughout the years of hunting and fishing has put too much pressure on the old ticker. I did make a few calls and our marshes are still dry, but good bass are still being caught, in fact a 6.11 pound was caught

in the Big Burns last Monday week.

Saltwater anglers are catching larger speckle trout, it seems, in this hot weather, than they caught during the early spring. A number of six and seven pounders were reported coming out of Big Lake.

A few shrimp are being taken, but I understand some inland waters are a hit and miss. Crabbing has been good, and lots of folks are enjoying some really good eating, not only boiling crabs, but also frying and barbecuing crabs.

It seems we've had an early hurricane season, with the first one coming into the Gulf and really not that far off from us. We need rain, but we surely don't need a storm to get it.

The latest I've got on the CCA's S.T.A.R. leader, was here in our west zone, was number one Jimmy Hebert, 7.70; second, Ernest Peatrose 7.70; and third, Jeff Streater, 7.50.

The flounder west was one and two, Michael Quienalty, 5.00 and 4.05 pounds, with Evelyn Collins, 1.45 pounds.

The largest sheephead is 9.60 while the largest drum is 41.75. For the cobia, there is a 34.40 pounder.

The new Cajun Calcutta division for speckle trout has a 6.25 pounder caught by Bryan Breaux. This is a \$5000 payoff, but entries cannot enter the regular trout division. There was no redfish that had a tag reported so far.

### GIBBSTOWN DOGFIGHT

There were several nice fish brought to the scales this past week for the week nine dogfight. There were sixteen boats entered. Jeb Linscombe and Kenny Trahan had three bass weighing 11.67 pounds for first place stringer and the largest bass weighing 6.11 pounds. Second place went to Tom Hess and Todd Morales with three bass weighing 6.63 pounds and the second place largest bass weighing 3.70 pounds. Darren Richard and Todd Conner took third place stringer with three bass weighing 5.88 pounds. Jeb and Kenny sort of blew away the competition with the very impressive stringer of 11.67 on three bass, this taken out of the marshes of the Big Burns. Kenny caught the large 6.11 pounder on a Senko plastic bait. As it stands now, Jeb and Kenny have the largest stringer for the dogfight of Gibbstown. Although we've seen some numbers of three pounders caught, there has only been two over four pounds and one over five pounds, so Kenny's 6.11 is the largest of the dogfight so far. I'll say this, with the water as low as it is, I wouldn't be surprised that we'll see a stringer and largest bass to top this, but I'll have to admit, it'll be hard to do.

## Do You Remember Custom House?

(EDITOR'S NOTE--The following article, which came from some source, was sent to the Pilot by W. T. Block, who has been writing historical articles for the paper for years. At the end of the article are some comments on it by Mr. Block, which he e-mailed to Conway LeBleu, former state representative for Cameron Parish.)

The Custom House was located on Theogene Miller property just west of what is now the Esso Service Station and Garage. Thomas P. Monroe was the customs officer in the 1880's and it was his duty to issue sailing paper for the many schooners traveling back and forth to Galveston, Texas, Mexico and other gulf coast ports.

The customs officer issued quarantine papers, keeping sailor or schooner passengers with contagious diseases such as yellow fever or smallpox from coming ashore. He also kept a log of all incoming and outgoing cargoes, and had to collect duty on some of these imports.

L. P. "Pete" Henry can still recall how he and other boys about ten years old, were fas-

inated by sacks of Mexican dollars stashed in a corner of the customs office. These dollars, he said, were worth about fifty cents each here. He never found out why the money was there or what was finally done with it.

### MR. BLOCK'S COMMENTS

Mexico did not coin dollars but they did coin Mexican gold pesos. There are only two ways I can imagine such coinage could have been at the customs house, and I can not imagine why it would have been there. The sawmillers were also shipping lumber for building the Mexican railroads, and perhaps a load of lumber was paid for in Mexican coins and the customs collector had confiscated it for some reason.

Also, don't forget that the pirate ship Hotspur had grounded on the Mermentau mudflat in Nov. 1820, and had a fortune in Spanish coins aboard. The wreckage soon washed out to sea. Had someone discovered the wreck and the customs house confiscated some of the pirate loot for some reason. I suppose there are other reasons.

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doctor's orders), adding inhalants to the list of banned substances, prohibition of hazing, adding restitution to the fire-alarm violation penalty, and expanding harassment to include stalking and retaliation.

Further, the duration of a suspension will be defined as ending at midnight on the last day of the suspension, regardless of the time of day the suspension began. All changes to policy require a 30-day waiting period before adoption, so the changes will be voted on at the July meeting.

The Board delayed a decision on reducing the Librarian position at Johnson Bayou School to part time. Board Member Dot Theriot objected to the action, saying it would make JBS the only school in the parish without a full-time library.

Dr. Chance asked the board to replace the French program at Cameron Elementary School with Spanish, citing the needs of the 11.2% Hispanic population at the school, and the need to align the language program with the high school, which offers Spanish. Theriot opposed the move, which would remove the only French program left in the parish, citing the parish's French heritage, but the change was adopted.

**Students learn about environment at camp**

(EDITOR'S NOTE-- The following account was written by one of the Marsh Maneuver participants.)

The 2005 Cal/Cam Marsh Maneuvers camp was held June 8 - 10. The campers met at the LSU AgCenter's Calcasieu Office at noon on the 8th. The students were given a 34 question Knowledge evaluation test on environmental science and coastal ecosystems. We departed for Cameron Prairie NWR around 1 p.m. There we toured the visitor's center and Mary McMahon led the water sampling in the pond. Our next stop was the Indian Mound in Little Chenier, where the students learned about pre history occupation of these ridges by native tribes. They also learned about the uniqueness of western La.'s chenier plain and how they were formed.

From here we proceeded to Rockefeller Refuge arriving at about 4 p.m. The group went crabbing until about 7 p.m., when we returned for dinner and ended the evening with the video "Haunted Waters", which is a program about coastal settlement in La. and the many effects man has had on the coastal ecosystem.

Thursday morning started out with an airboat ride across the marsh to the beach. There, George Melancon told the group about formation of the chenier plain marshes and how the Louisiana coast and Rockefeller has experienced serious marsh loss and the effect of those losses on productivity and other functions. We returned to the camp where Jimmy Meaux talked to the group about nonpoint source pollution and went over the enviroscape demonstration with the group.

Kevin Savoie, gave a powerpoint presentation on the functions and values of wetlands, watersheds, and man's impacts on the coast. After lunch, we were taken out to the Joseph Harbor outlet to the Gulf where we viewed beach erosion firsthand. We also trawled for estuarine dependent species and plankton and visited a water control structure and talked about marsh management.

The last set of water samples was taken on this trip near the gulf outlet. This gave us three sets of samples; fresh, brackish, and salt. That evening we caught enough crabs and shrimp for a boil.

That night, the students

were introduced to the role play exercise where each one was assigned a role. Mary McMahon reviewed all of the water test results and discussed what each parameter means to the health of the environment.

Friday morning the role play was carried out, where each student had to defend his/her position using what they learned during the week. Afterwards, a post-test was given.

The overall average increase in scores over pre-test scores was 59%, the highest since this camp began in 1997.

Myles Hebert gave the group a short presentation on La.'s Coastal Nonpoint Program and how it is implemented. He also presented the students with t-shirts and bags and prepared a lunch for us before we departed for home.

**Beach advisories**

Swimming advisories have been issued for the beach water at Little Florida, Martin and three sections of Holly Beach in Cameron Parish.

These locations join the list of swim advisories issued earlier for Constance, Gulf Breeze, Hackberry, Rutherford and two other sections of Holly Beach, all in Cameron Parish. These advisories all remain in effect until samples show water bacteria levels are acceptably lowered.

Please note that this is NOT a closure of the beach or facilities at any of these locations. All areas remain open for boating and land-based activities.

The advisories, issued through the Louisiana Beach Monitoring Program, state that the public should avoid swimming at these locations because the high levels of bacteria are a potential health risk. This is especially important for the elderly, babies, small children and people who are chronically ill or have compromised immune systems. The advisories remain in effect until DHH samples show water bacterial levels are acceptably lowered.

The program monitors bacteria levels of water at 13 locations throughout the state from May through October. For more information on the program or to check the status of monitoring at the different locations, please visit [www.ophbeach-monitoring.com](http://www.ophbeach-monitoring.com).

By virtue of and in conformity with the provisions of Sub-part A of Chapter 2, Title 30 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended, and other applicable laws, sealed bids will be received in the Office of Mineral Resources, LaSalle Office Building, Baton Rouge, Louisiana (P. O. Box 2822, Baton Rouge, LA 70821) on or before **12:00 noon on Tuesday, July 12, 2005** for a lease to explore, drill for and produce oil, gas and any other liquid or gaseous minerals in solution and produced with oil or gas on the following described tracts (**Tract Nos. 37488 through 37635 , inclusive**) to be opened publicly **Wednesday, July 13, 2005** in the LaSalle Office Building, 617 N. 3rd Street Capitol Complex, Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

All bids shall offer a "**Cash Payment**" bonus, as set forth on the authorized bid form, for a lease having a primary term in conformity with whether said lease is an **inland or offshore** lease and the said bonus shall maintain the lease in full force and effect for the first year. If the bid offers an **ANNUAL DELAY RENTAL**, which is mandatory for leases with terms of more than one (1) year, it shall not be for less than **one-half (1/2)** of the Cash Payment bonus bid and any bids containing an annual delay rental of less than one-half (1/2) of the Cash Payment bonus will be increased to the one-half (1/2) amount. Act 8 of the 2000 Second Extraordinary Legislative Session established two additional fees to be collected from mineral lessees on all mineral leases awarded. **An additional fee of \$10 per acre will be collected and deposited into the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Conservation Fund. **Corrected check, cashier's check or bank money order** payable to the **OFFICE OF MINERAL RESOURCES** will be accepted. The corrected Cash Payment bonus shall be submitted with and accompany each bid, and no bid, once submitted, may be thereafter withdrawn or canceled. Once the bid is opened and accepted by the Mineral Board, the accompanying checks or money order shall be negotiated by the Office of Mineral Resources and the proceeds disbursed in the manner required by law.

**SPECIAL NOTE:** Under rules promulgated by the Department of Natural Resources in accordance with authority granted by Act 106 of the First Extraordinary Session of the Louisiana Legislature of 2002, a **fee equal to ten percent (10%) of the Cash Payment bonus bid is required to be submitted with separate check, either accompanying the original bid (inside the sealed bid envelope) or mailed to the Office of Mineral Resources for receipt within ten (10) days after the bid is accepted and the lease is awarded. # Hydrangeas easy to grow in shady beds

Hydrangeas can bring color to your shady beds.

Among the most popular summer flowering shrubs for shady gardens, hydrangeas provide flower clusters like fluffy balls of cotton candy.

From now through July, huge flower heads of pink, blue and blends of those two colors appear above the rich green leaves of these plants.

Potted hydrangeas are popular gifts for Mother's Day, and they can be a gift that lasts. Once their flowers fade, these gift plants can be planted outside where they will provide beautiful flowers for years to come.

Hydrangeas (Hydrangea macrophylla) are deciduous shrubs originally native to Japan. They need an evenly moist soil and are intolerant of dry conditions. If you allow hydrangeas to wilt excessively, either those growing in pots or in the ground, it will shorten the life of the flowers and can cause the foliage to develop scorched edges.

Display your potted hydrangeas in a bright, sunny window, and make sure the soil stays moist so the plant does not wilt. When the flowers begin to look unattractive (nothing lasts forever), cut off the flower heads and plant the shrub in an appropriate location in your landscape. Blooming hydrangeas also may be available at local nurseries and could be purchased and planted into garden beds now.

Locate hydrangeas in a spot where they receive some shade during the day. A shady (two hours of direct sun) or partly shaded (about four hours of direct sun) bed is ideal. Avoid hot, sunny, dry areas or beds that are baked by the afternoon sun. Morning sun is much preferred by these plants, so an eastern exposure is excellent.

Hydrangeas do best in beds that have been amended with generous amounts of organic matter, such as compost, rotted manure or peat moss. Dig in a 2-4 inch layer of organic matter during bed preparation. The organic matter helps retain moisture in the soil.

Once planted, it is important to keep hydrangeas well watered. Water deeply and thoroughly two or three times a week while they get established and then once or twice a week later on if the weather is dry. Hydrangeas also benefit from a 2-3 inch layer of mulch, such as leaves, pine straw, cypress mulch or pine bark, over their root system to help maintain a moist soil condition.

Interestingly, the colorful parts of the flower head are not part of the flowers at all. What you might think of as petals actually are modified sepals. The actual flowers are

tiny, inconspicuous and located in the middle of the four showy sepals. The flowers which have showy sepals are called sterile flowers.

The mophead or hortensia hydrangeas have huge round heads of sterile flowers. Another group, the lacecap hydrangeas, has a center cluster of small fertile flowers, which are not showy, surrounded by a ring of attractive sterile flowers. The popular variegated hydrangea is a lacecap type.

When the colorful flower heads turn green it signals the ideal time to prune your plants. First, cut off the faded flower heads with stems about 4-6 inches. If you are trying to reduce the size of your bush, cut the heads with longer stems.

If there are any especially tall shoots, or if you need to cut the whole bush back to reduce its size, you may continue to cut back shoots to achieve the desired results. Pruning back stimulates new growth - creating a fuller, shapelier bush. This type of pruning must be done by the end of July at the latest. Hydrangeas set their flower buds for the next year in late summer, so any pruning after that removes the flower buds and reduces or eliminates flowers the next year.

The flower heads of hydrangeas are rather unique. Depending on how acid or alkaline the soil the plant is growing in, the colorful sepals can be different colors.

For example, if you have pink hydrangeas and you want them to be blue, treat the soil around the bushes with aluminum sulphate in March and again in October each year. Gradually, over time, the flower heads will turn blue. If your hydrangeas are blue and you want them to be pink, treat the soil around the bushes with lime following the same schedule. It may take a couple of years to be fully effective.

The intensity of the color is controlled by genetics and depends on the variety you are growing. Since white hydrangeas do not have pigment in their sepals, they are white regardless of the soil pH. But the others can be varied.

While thinking of hydrangeas, don't forget our native oak leaf hydrangea (Hydrangea quercifolia). With its large pointed cones of white flowers, which age to dusty rose, and its dark green attractive leaves, it also deserves consideration for shady areas of your landscape. Larger growing than standard hydrangeas (up to six feet), oak leaf hydrangeas also are deciduous and have the added attraction of orange to burgundy fall color.

## Audrey only severe hurricane to hit this area since 1901

Since 1901, Louisiana has been hit by seven severe hurricanes, but there have been no severe hurricane strikes - Category 3 or higher - on the state for more than 12 years, and the western part of the state has been hit by only one severe storm during the past 104 years.

These are just a few of the observations made by a team of LSU researchers who have been examining Louisiana's hurricane history. LSU Geography and Anthropology Assistant Professor and State Climatologist Barry Keim, James P. Morgan Distinguished Professor of Oceanography and Coastal Sciences Greg Stone and Professor Emeritus Bob Muller have been compiling data on tropical storm, hurricane and severe hurricane strikes in Louisiana during the period of 1901-2004.

According to their analysis, Louisiana has been hit by 55 tropical storms, 21 Category 1 or 2 hurricanes and seven severe hurricanes of Category 3 or higher. The seven severe hurricanes were an unnamed hurricane in 1909, Audrey in 1957, Hilda in 1964, Betsy in 1965, Camille in 1969, Carmen in 1974 and Andrew in 1992. Though the state has not taken a severe hurricane hit since Andrew in 1992, there have been some close calls, including Georges in 1998, which grazed New Orleans; Lili in 2002, which declined in intensity just before landfall; and Ivan in 2004, which veered away from the state and demolished parts of the Alabama and Florida coastlines.

The western part of the state - from Lafayette to the Texas boarder - has been hit by only one severe hurricane since 1901.

"This region is an anomaly along the Central Gulf Coast, as areas to the east and west have substantially greater hurricane frequencies," said Muller. "To date, we do not have a conclusive explanation for this, but it could have some relation to the configuration of the coastline, or, perhaps, it could be random chance."

Hurricane Audrey in 1957 was the lone severe hurricane to strike the western region.

The researchers also found that there were 31 tropical storm strikes in the first half of the 20th century, but only 19 in the second half. However, there were six severe hurricane strikes in the second half of the century, compared to only one in the first half.

"There was a very active period of severe hurricanes from 1957 to 1974," said Keim. "In that span of 18 years, Louisiana experienced five of its seven severe hurricane strikes."

During the past three hurricane seasons, Louisiana has been hit by five tropical storms and only one Category 2 hurricane. Nevertheless, predictions are for a few more decades of "hyperactive" hurricane seasons in the North Atlantic Basin, and Stone said that extensive land loss in coastal Louisiana has resulted in an increase in storm damage vulnerability for Louisiana infrastructure and residents.

"With every new hurricane season coastal Louisiana becomes increasingly vulnerable to storm surge and wave damage associated with tropical cyclones," Stone explained. "We are at a critical juncture in Louisiana, where now even tropical storms and weak hurricanes can inflict considerably more inundation than more powerful storms of the past."

Louisiana's barrier islands and wetlands provide a significant first line of defense and play a critical role in mitigating storm surge and waves; however, they are eroding at alarmingly high rates and, as such, are becoming less effective in buffering the effects of storms."

Implications for large-scale damage and the potential loss of life are extremely profound for large cities such as New Orleans, he added.

## Plan now for hurricanes

Hurricane planning and preparation can make a difference in making it to safe shelter, reducing damage to your home, coping during a storm and recovering easily after one, according to experts with the LSU AgCenter.

Although this year's hurricane season is only a few days old, the year's first tropical storm could be headed our way by the weekend. Experts predict Arlene could make landfall by Saturday, and southeast Louisiana is among the areas within the storm's potential path.

LSU AgCenter disaster education coordinator Pat Skinner says long-term planning is the best way to prepare for storms, but she points out it's never too late to begin making preparations.

"If you've already thought out what you need to do and made a hurricane or storm plan, now is the time to use it," Skinner says. "But if you

don't have a plan, there still are lots of things you can do in the few days or hours before a storm hits."

"Living With Hurricanes," a publication developed by the LSU AgCenter, includes information on planning for wind and water damage, preparing emergency supplies and items needed if you evacuate, and developing a family emergency plan.

The publication, which is available online in the Publications section of www.lsuagcenter.com or the special hurricane section of that site at www.lsuagcenter.com/hurricanes, provides details on the extent of damage wind and storm surges can inflict on property. Since hurricanes can cause flooding where it has never flooded before, the LSU AgCenter publication also recommends ways to reduce damage to belongings if such flooding occurs.






