Beach goes and arrests way down

Cameron Parish Sheriff's Deputies made 20 arrests over the July 4th weekend, well down from the usual total of 70 to 100. Several factors may have contributed to this result.

The 20 Alcohol and Tobacco Control officers, in the area for the sixth year, have made the climate for underage drinking less friendly, possibly reducing such behavior. The recent swimming advisories may have made the crowd smaller than usual.

And because of the move to the Calcasieu Parish jail, many less serious offenses were dealt with by means of a misdemeanor summons instead of arrest.

Whatever the reason, Deputy Edward Racca, Jr. said "I've been here 16 years and I've never seen it this quiet." Investigator Jake McCain noted that "families are starting to come out more" to Holly Beach.

Even though the weekend seemed somewhat quieter than usual, several accidents were reported

Audrey Museum plans discussed at meeting

It has been 48 years since Hurricane Audrey slammed into the pre-dawn hours of June 27, 1957. That date is burned into the memory of every person who endured that horrible event.

The date is so significant that Cameron residents divide history into "before Audrey" and "after Audrey", sometimes just "before the storm" and "after the storm." Everyone knows which storm is meant.

When an out-of-town visitor asks, "Didn't you folks have a bad hurricane back around...", we immediately respond "1957." The event made an impact, not only on local people, but on the entire nation. "Audrey" (we don't need to say "Hurricane Audrey"), the sixth deadliest hurricane since accurate record keeping began in 1900, took from 390 to 500 lives, depending on the source of information. No hurricane since has claimed so many. The devastation it wrought took years to overcome.

Finally, there is a proposal to create a Hurricane Audrey Museum to document this storm and memorialize its victims. The Creole Nature Trail All-American Road and the Southwest Louisiana Convention and Visitors Bureau have received grants totaling around \$400,000 to begin work on a museum and science center. The funds are from the Federal Highway Administration/Scenic Byways and the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development.

The agencies held a meeting in Cameron on June 29 to receive input from survivors, residents and other interested parties about the location, focus and content of the proposed museum. Monte Hurley, representing the SWLACVB, stated that "nothing has been decided yet, that's what this meeting

is all about."

With the direction of facilitator Robert Kidder, the over 80 people in the room attempted to identify the target audience, elements to include, type of facility needed, and funding sources to tap.

The grants require that the museum have an educational and science component, and ideas ranged from hurricane tracking charts and a simulated weather studio to a wind tunnel and a retired hurricane hunter plane. Emphasis on the changes that have taken place in hurricane forecasting since Audrey was stressed.

A thorough documentation of Audrey, including the devastation, survival, and recovery, was foremost on the minds of the assembly. A memorial wall naming the dead was suggested, along with a documentary film using archival footage.

The possibility that the museum could evolve into a "national hurricane museum" led to a discussion of what the facility might feature if the budget was "unlimited." Helicopter rides, an Imax or

immersion theater, wave machine/water park, hurricane hunter simulator, and a building shaped like a hurricane were some of the imaginative concepts.

One site suggested for a museum of that scope was the former Audrey Memorial School on Trosclair Road. The school has been closed since 1969 and, while it has been used for vocational education and a physical therapy center, it is now vacant. School Supt. Dr. Doug Chance has expressed interest in pursuing the idea with school board members.

Another site suggested was the old Bonsall home in Grand Chenier, recently purchased by the Cameron Parish Library. The house, which sits on a large parcel of land, survived the storm and has another connection.

Franklin Roosevelt once stayed there, and his memories of the area reportedly

New evacuation rules won't affect Cameron

The Cameron Parish Office of Emergency Preparedness (OEP) "won't change how we do business," according to Director Freddie Richard, speaking to the Cameron Parish Police Jury Tuesday evening. Richard said the new state evacuation guidelines are geared more toward high population areas such as New Orleans.

"The plan to evacuate coastal areas 50 hours before gale force winds hit the beach would be foolish for us," he said, noting that such a plan would have had lower Cameron Parish evacuated Sunday evening when the storm was barely in the Gulf.

The state guidelines are a response to the problems associated with Hurricane Ivan last year, and should help in the New Orleans area he said.

Richard also reported that OEP has received another \$193,000 in homeland security grant awards, for a total to date of \$786,000. Past grants have been used for radios, self contained breathing apparatus, defibrillators, and other

emergency equipment.

The current grant will go for more SCBAs for firefighters, a defibrillator for an EMT unit, and mobile video enforcer equipment for the Sheriff's Office. The Jury voted to advertise these items for bid.

VARIANCE REQUEST DENIED

Jurors sympathized with a request from Leslie Wayne Baggerley of Johnson Bayou, for a medical variance for his mobile home, but explained that their hands were tied by FEMA.

The Federal Emergency Management Administration has told the jury it will not approve any medical variances. The new FEMA director's position is that under-height dwellings pose a danger to other dwellings in a flood and also a danger to their occupants and rescuers in case of fast-rising water.

Parish Administrator Tina Horn said that FEMA takes no notice of the difference between rising flood waters, as from a river, and wind driven water, as in a hurricane.

Bonus for teachers to be continued

The Cameron Parish School Board held a special meeting June 30 to approve final changes to the 2004-2005 budget. Due to an unexpected increase in oil and gas royalties and in tax collections, board accountant Margaret Jones projects a budget surplus of \$864,827.

However, \$495,166.30 of that total is in the form of protested taxes and cannot be used until the protests are settled.

Oil and gas royalties on leases of school sections have increased by \$331,000 over projections made in March, due to the record price of oil which has topped \$60 a barrel. Jones expects royalties to continue to be up as long as oil prices are so high.

She also noted increased interest in leases. Tax collections have increased by \$259,000 over March projections as well.

The board also approved certificated personnel for the next school year with only three vacancies yet to be filled. Two elementary lan-

guage teachers and a guidance counselor for Johnson Bayou are still being considered.

Discussion on the status of the Johnson Bayou school library has been postponed until the regular board meeting July 11.

Supt. Doug Chance asked the board to consider giving support personnel the same one-time pay supplement the legislature is promising teachers, about \$530. He said it would cost about \$70,000, which is available. The board plans to continue its practice of giving teachers and support personnel a bonus every year based on interest earned on its 16th section fund.

According to Jones, 75% of the interest each year is dedicated to teachers and 25% to support personnel.

The board will also consider buying four new buses with some of the surplus. In the past, three buses were purchased each year to keep the fleet up to date, but for the past few years none have been purchased due to budget constraints. Each new bus would cost about \$50,000.

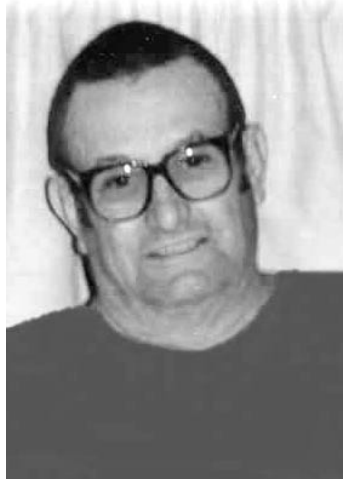

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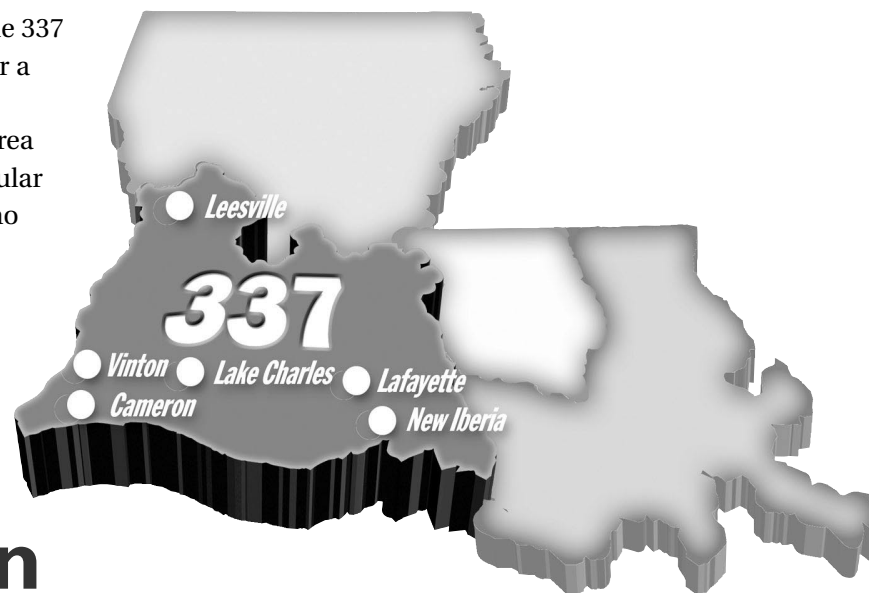
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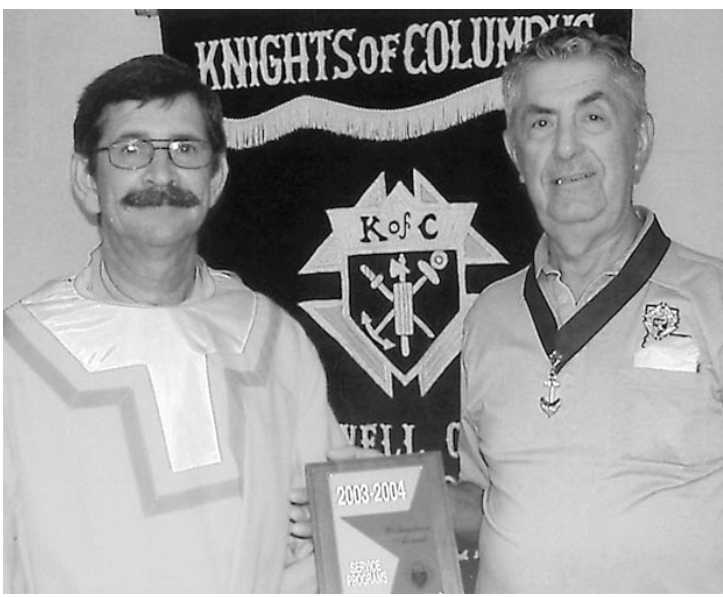

Hurricane Audrey Museum should be in Cam. Parish

Dear Editor,

On Wednesday, June 29, I attended a meeting at the Cameron Police Jury Annex to discuss a "Hurricane Audrey Museum." The meeting was organized and conducted by the Southwest Louisiana Convention and Visitors Bureau.

The purpose was to obtain suggestions from Hurricane Audrey survivors and other Cameron Parish residents on what type of exhibits should be in the museum. We were told to make suggestions "as if we had an unlimited budget."

Toward the end of the two-hour meeting, we were told that the Convention and Visitors Bureau has obtained a \$400,000 grant to "study" the project, but that any additional funds for actual construction of the museum would have to come from other sources, as yet unidentified.

However, the most distressing aspect of the meeting was that we learned that the museum may not even be located in Cameron Parish. Instead, it may be at a location more "accessible" and "convenient" for tourists traveling on Interstate 10.

Moreover, according to those conducting the meeting, no place south of Interstate 10 would be safe from flood waters. We were asked to turn over all our pictures and artifacts from the Hurricane, yet no one could give us any assurance that the museum

would even be located in our Parish.

This is a travesty. These agencies constantly proclaim that they seek to promote the economic development of the entire Southwest Louisiana area, yet Cameron Parish is never allowed any benefits that Calcasieu Parish wants. We can't have a river boat, we can't have a high level bridge over the Calcasieu Ship Channel.

Hurricane Audrey was by far the worst hurricane of the modern area, measured, as it should be, by loss of life. Maybe residents of Calcasieu Parish had some tree limbs down and roof damage, but how can that compare to what we have suffered here, where hardly a building was left standing in the southern part of the Parish, and where almost every family was touched by the tragic loss of loved ones?

While I'm on my soap box, I would like to correct a popular misconception held by many Calcasieu Parish residents, who believe that so many people drowned because the people of Cameron Parish refused to evacuate. This is totally false. In those days, hurricane detection was much less sophisticated than it is today. The evening before June 27, 1957, Cameron Parish residents were told by the Lake Charles media and the Weather Service that there was no need to evacuate until the following day.

prompted him to include the Cameron Court House in the Works Progress Administration. He is said to have insisted that the building be able to survive a hurricane and provide shelter, which it did nearly 20 years later. Library Director Charlotte Trosclair suggested that if the library could include a genealogy component, the building could be made available through a cooperative endeavor agreement. This feature would allow for part-time staffing as well.

Whatever site is chosen must be located on the Creole Nature Trail, which runs for 180 miles through Cameron and Calcasieu parishes. One thing all meeting participants agreed upon was that the museum should be located in Cameron Parish.

Kidder, who does not represent the CVB or Nature Trail board, said "It's kind of a given that it will be in Cameron Parish," but that funding could affect the location. In other words, "if someone gives you \$10 million and says it needs to be in a certain

place," you might listen to them.

Hackberry and Grand Lake have been suggested due to their higher elevation and distance from the Gulf.

Local attorney Jennifer Jones said "If it's not in Cameron Parish, then nothing we have done here matters," a sentiment echoed by many others. Local funding would likely help influence the outcome.

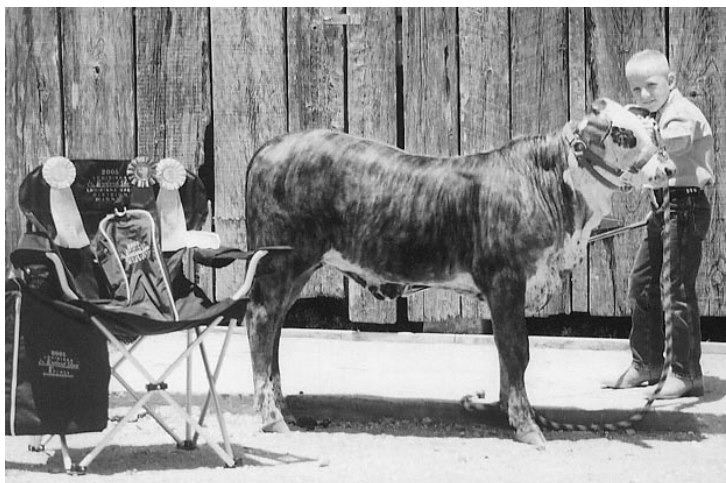
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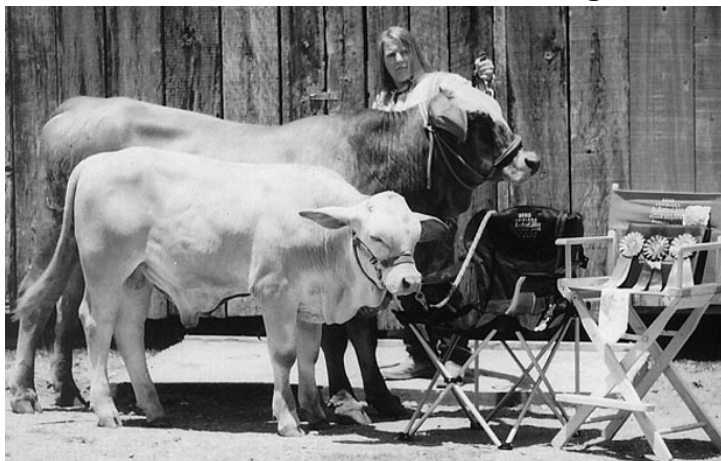

HOLIDAY EVENTS
Many folks celebrated the long July 4th Independence Day weekend with either visiting friends and family, outdoor cooking and some fishing, while others fished the 68th annual Southwest Louisiana Fishing Rodeo, something that used to be held here in Cameron, but moved to Lake Charles. Anglers faced with thunderstorms and heavy rains and lightning braved this type of weather during the entire fishing rodeo. Rough seas made offshore fishing

tough, even the Big Lake area had white caps with fairly good winds churning the water. My son-in-law, Travis Broussard, fished Big Lake Friday and found calmer waters on the western bank of the lake on the east side of the channel. There wasn't much bird activity, but bait fish were in the shallow waters and speckle trout were chasing the bait, but really tough to catch and rather small in size up to 3 pounds. The wind breeze felt good but the heat index was really hot and uncomfortable.

The weigh-in for the rodeo had some good fish weighed the first day, with a number of fish breaking last year's mark and some that will go into the state's largest species records. I was really impressed with the large garfish taken the first two days, with the top one weighing in at 73.80 pounds. This reminds me of an old fishing friend from Cameron, Ray Burleigh, who caught and entered many large garfish and won quite a few rodeos. He fished them with a steel leader and made a loop, set the bait in the loop and when the gar would take the bait, he would pull and tighten the hook, mostly on the upper jaw and hold on for dear life.

There were a number of good fish weighed in Saturday, but a 57.80 pound drum and 28.55 redfish should be heard to beat. If the weather didn't change the 6.95 speckle trout was also a good fish.

Sunday's weigh-in saw lots of better weights, compared to last year, even though weather was a rough factor. Lots of offshore anglers were fishing 30 to 100 miles offshore and their catches were really good.

The final results were as follows: Offshore - amberjack, Mike Shetler, 85.75; cobia, Alan Smith, 48.70; grouper, Alan Smith, 24.65; red snapper, Bert Chatagnier, 15.0; Spanish mackerel, Mike Wingate, 3.53; tuna, Bryan Vincent, 61.65; wahoo, David McElveen, 56.15; tripletail, Kevin Natali, 8.71; spade fish, Kevin Natali, 7.60; barracuda, Leo Thibodeaux, 32.40; blackfin tuna, Keith Monroe, 27.20; bonita, Leon Cole, 13.31; dolphin, Carol Dubois, 36.75; jackfish, Dale Hernandez, 27.65; trigger fish, Mark LeLeux, 8.95; blue fish, Brett Travis, 4.51.

Results of the inland group: speckle trout, Stephen Lonza, 6.95; redfish, Randy Reid, 32.25; flounder, Sam Booth, 2.56; black drum, John McRay, 51.80; croaker, Josh Daigle, 1.05; gaff top catfish, Kevin Natali, 7.85; garfish, Tim Nunez, 73.80; sheephead, Jay Stark, 5.84.

Fly fishing group: flounder, Kevin Natali 1.75, all three places, as well as Spanish mackerel, 1.28, all three places, and speckle trout, 1.28, all three places; Johnny Desormeaux had the largest redfish, 11.37 plus, all three places.

The outstanding inland angler was Stephen Lonza, outstanding offshore angler was Kevin Natali; scuba division, Craig Bourque; junior angler, Taylor Dumas; overall top bait - flying cloud; tag and release best, nitpicker.

The most unusual fish, a black jack fish, Bert Chatagnier; redfish with most spots 17, went to Paul Bordonel and the hard luck award went to our local Jimmy Saltzman, boat trouble, motor trouble and no fish.

Keeping up with angler Kevin Natali -- in the past eight years he's won nine outstanding awards. He really goes for a batch of different species of fish and it has paid off for him, plus he's a good fisherman.

This year there was the point system earning so many points in each category, first thru third to declare winners in each division.

There were 349 anglers taking part this year another year of success for the 68th annual event.

LACASSINE REFUGE
I got a message from Mr. Don Voros, manager of the Southwest Louisiana Refuge Complex, which oversees Lacassine, Sabine and Cameron Prairie National Wildlife Refuges. After making certain repairs to structure of the Lacassine Refuge that no boards were pulled since last October and there is no draining of the pool, that

the low water levels are a result of the drought we're in.

This I can understand, as just look at what the drought has done to the Big Burn and even the trails and ponds off the main canals in the old Amoco Field, as well as the Rockefeller Refuge marshes. Although we get short rains from time to time, with some 2 to 3 inches, it'll take lots of rain to put water into our marshes.

I really appreciate the concern Mr. Voros had and for his invitation to go with him and visit these structures and the pool, but time was not in my favor.

GIBBSTOWN DOGFIGHT

Week 12 of the Gibbstown Dogfight had 20 boats enter. The low waters have seen the number of boats decline it seems, but still some good bass coming out of the marsh, even though you've got to watch where you go or should I say, watch where you want to go.

Quentin LeBouf and Carl Murphy again took first place with 3 bass weighing 7.06 pounds and again this week Quentin had the largest bass of 2.83 and again caught the bass using a pop-r, fishing the Big Burn marsh. Cody Benton and Martin Greenwold had second place, 3 bass weighing 6.25 pounds. Each bass in these two team stringers averaged better than 2 pounds

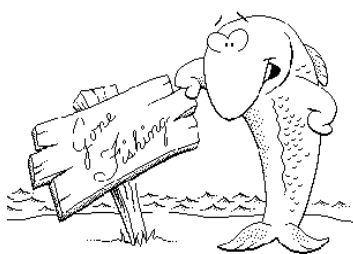

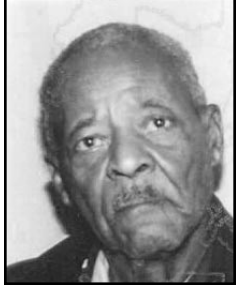

Shrimping closed in this area

The Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries announced the closure of the 2005 spring shrimp season in Shrimp Management Zone 3.

Zone 3 comprises State inside waters from the western shore of Vermilion Bay and Southwest Pass at Marsh Island to the Louisiana-Texas state line.

All inshore waters from the Mississippi-Louisiana state line, except for a portion of Mississippi Sound and the open waters of Breton and Chandeleur Sound are closed to the harvest of shrimp.

The closure was based on recommendations made by LDWF Marine Fisheries Division biologists. The relative number, percentage and distribution of small white shrimp immigrating into the areas to be closed has increased substantially in the past week and the region is being closed to protect these developing shrimp.

Scott Henry, District 3 president, said the removal of the plug will enable Miami Corp. to introduce salt water into its property which is part of the Cameron-Creole Watershed.

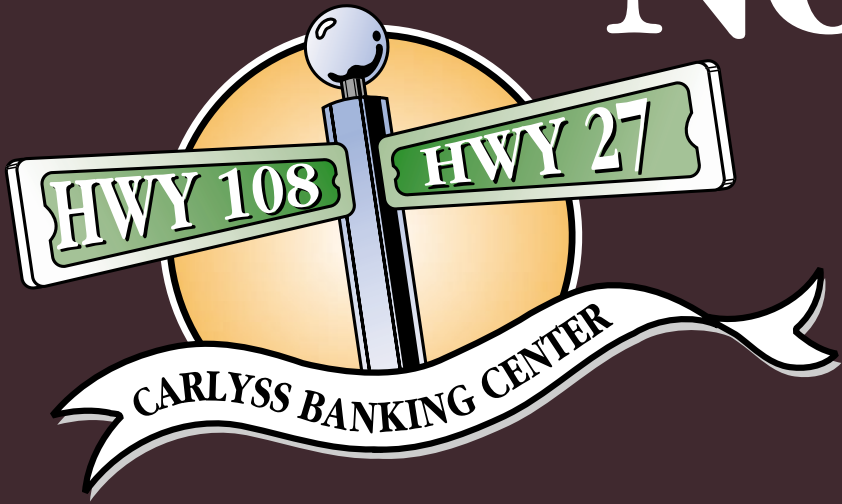
