“Little Chenier” to be name of movie being shot here

A movie currently being filmed in SW Louisiana will be named “Little Chenier” when it is released, according to producer and co-writer Jace Johnson. The movie’s working is “Little Bayou.”

Jace, along with his sisters Amy Johnson (location manager and associate producer) and Bethany Ashton (director and co-writer), grew up visiting their father’s camp on Little Chenier. Their fond memories of fishing and hunting in the area led them to try to make a film that would show Louisiana, and especially Little Chenier, in a positive light.

With the help of other backers, the trio has managed to make their dream a reality, bringing a two million dollar production to SWLA. The project is employing over 100 extras and 20 speaking roles from the area.

Cameron Parish’s Abe Manuel Band will provide the music for the film, and many local sites have been used as film locations.

Little Chenier Road, Grand Chenier, the Mermentau River Bridge, Ron Ardoin’s camp, Fredman’s bar, and the Cameron Court House have all been used as movie locations, as well as sites in Hackberry.

Local folks have rolled out the red carpet for the cast and crew, Cameron style. After shooting at Fredman’s, several local cooks got together and served up a typical Cameron Parish feast to give the Hollywood folks a real taste of Louisiana.

“Everyone in Cameron Parish has been absolutely fantastic,” said producer Gavin Boyd. Most of the locations in Cameron Parish have been provided at no charge to the company. Sheriff Theos Duhon even loaned uniforms to his fictional counterpart Sheriff LeBauve.

Local people have also gotten an introduction into the world of movie production. Those hanging around the sets have been amazed at what goes into each shot.

Richard McClelland works in the Court House and watched as the director called “Cut” over and over again during the filming of a scene in the “Sheriff’s Office.” He

said any little noise or wrong move would cause a repeat, and some were called for no reason he could see.

Scott Trahan has been helping the location manager with finding places to film and all sorts of other things. “They called at seven in the morning needing to get into the Court House last Wednesday,” he said, “and

then the costume mistress had forgotten to bring a red dress and I had to go find one. We ended up going to the Dollar Store.”

Scott arranged with Mac Haynie to let the large group use his night spot “Mac’s Shack” for lunch and a waiting area while scenes were filmed in Creole. Haynie said

Two film crew members are attacked by gang in L. Charles

Two members of the “Little Bayou” film crew, who have been making a movie in Cameron Parish, were beaten by eight men Monday while leaving a Lake Charles pub.

The two were a producer and an assistant director who were walking to their car near Broad and Bilbo streets.

One of the victims was knocked unconscious by one of the attackers with a 6-foot stick and was treated at a hospital. The other man was beaten in the face.

Lake Charles Mayor Randy Roach said “It was a very senseless act.” Lake Charles police are investigating the incident which was apparently a robbery attempt.

The film producers reportedly are spending two million dollars in Southwest Louisiana and were hoping to bring other movies to the area in the future.

The film crew has been staying in Lake Charles at night while filming in Cameron.

Capt. Night is Thursday **Blessing of Fleet set** **Pageant to be held**

As a preliminary to the second annual Cameron Saltwater Fishing Festival, Captains Night will be held at 6 p.m., Thursday, July 28 at the Cameron Jetty Pavilion.

Rules and regulations will be provided to fishermen and a fish supper will be served. Free cold beverages will be furnished by Budweiser, Coca-Cola and Miller Light.

Fishing rodeo ticket receipts will provide admission to Captains Night and tickets may be purchased at the door.

Tickets purchased on Captains Night will be given the discount rate of \$25 to enter the offshore competition, \$25 bay and surf and \$50 for both divisions. Youth tickets (15 and under) are \$15.

Entry fees for non-fishermen are \$2 per day. Children ten and under are free.

All beaches are open in parish

All of Cameron Parish’s beaches, as well as all of the other beaches in Louisiana, were found to be free of pollution when testing was done by the La. Dept. of Health last week.

This meant there were no health warnings posted on Hackberry, Rutherford, Holly, Constance, Gulf Breeze, Little Florida, Martin and Long Beaches, all located in Cameron Parish.

This was the first time this summer all of the beaches in the parish and Louisiana were unposted. However, there were always several parish beaches open to swimmers since the testing began several months ago.

The absence of postings was good news for Cameron parish beach motels, cabins, convenience stores and bars, who did better business than usual this past week.

However, all of the beaches have been open for non-swimming activities throughout the summer, including sun bathing, shelling, barbecues and picnics.

Monitoring of the beaches will continue until October and be resumed in May next year.

Monday, Aug. 1 is the deadline for entry forms to be sent in for the Cameron Saltwater Fishing Festival Pageant.

The pageant will be held at 9:30 a.m., Saturday, Aug. 6 at the Cameron Jetty Pavilion.

The pageant is open to girls in seven divisions from birth up to age 15.

Entry fee is \$20 for the first child and \$10 for any additional child in the family.

Contestants are asked to come dressed, casual wear. There are no dressing facilities. The pageant will be held under a covered pavilion.

Proceeds will benefit the Cameron Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce.

3 divisions in rodeo

The Cameron Parish Registrar of Voters Office will talk about the options the elderly have in upcoming elections such as voting by mail, absentee voting, etc.

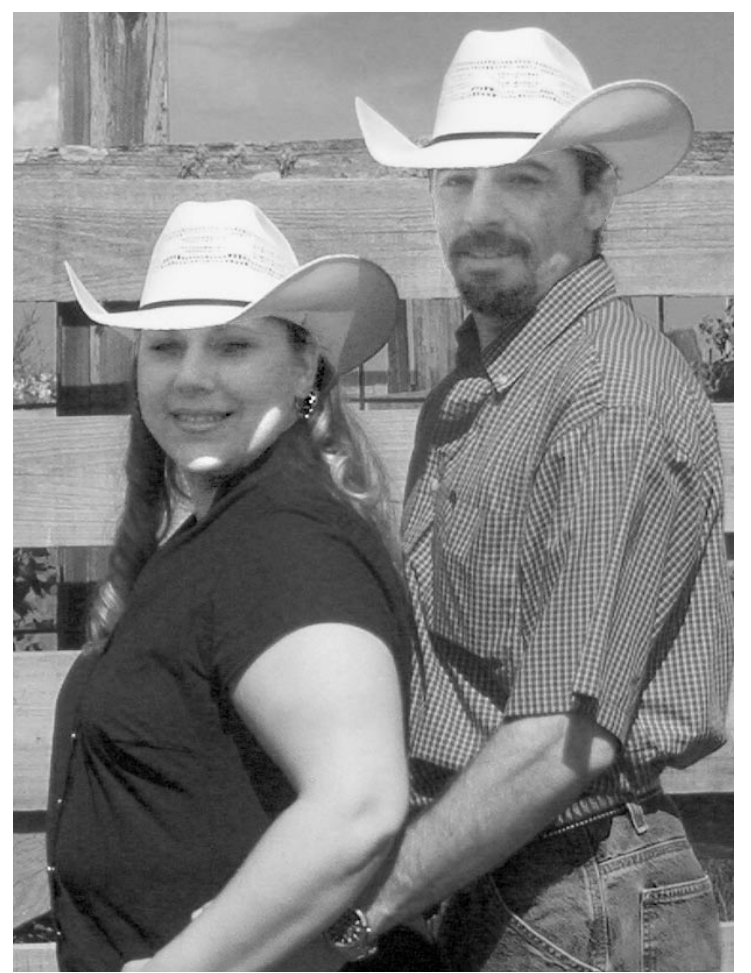
LSU Horticulturist, Robert Turley, will talk about gardening tips and safety for the elderly along with some helpful handouts on pest control and other gardening advice.

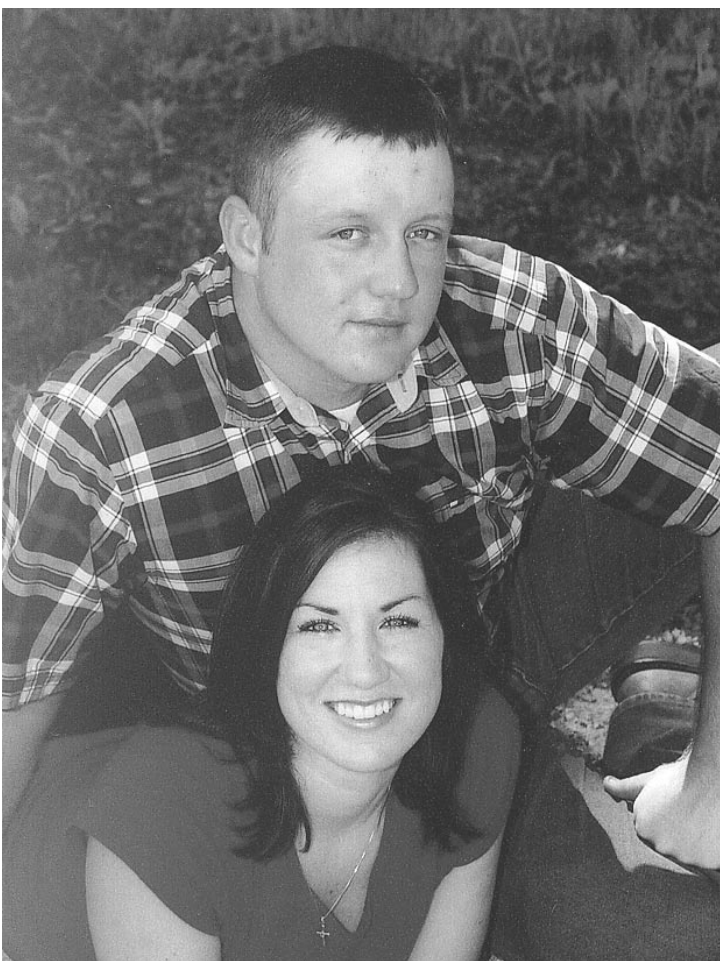

POLICE JURY MEETING:

Economic development can be spurred by marketing

Economic development and insurance dominated the Cameron Parish Police Jury's agenda meeting Monday afternoon. Repairs and a justice of the peace vacancy were also discussed.

George Swift, Director of the SW Partnership for Economic Development, gave a report on the activities of the Partnership, of which Cameron Parish is a member. According to Swift, the main thing holding SWLA back has been a lack of an aggressive marketing program.

To alleviate this problem, his office has placed ads in ten industry publications, begun to set up booths at industry trade shows, and created brochures, a database, and a website to showcase the opportunities SWLA has to offer a prospective business.

For local businesses, the Partnership has begun a business retention program to help the businesses already located here. A meeting has been set up with representatives of several national franchises to explain to prospective franchisees the advantages of their industry, and a technical assistance grant program is soon to be announced.

The office of the SWLA Partnership is located in the old Magnolia Life Building in Lake Charles, now owned by the Calcasieu Police Jury. A conference room is available there for business meetings, and office space is available at a low rate for new businesses. An international trade representative of the U.S. Commerce Department visits the office weekly for consultation.

Swift said his office is pursuing the infrastructure needs of SWLA, such as a bridge over the Calcasieu River at Cameron, with the legislature. When asked, he also said he personally supported placing the proposed Hurricane Audrey Museum in Cameron, but the board would set the Partnership's official policy. Sonny McGee, Willie Daigle, and Julie Benoit are Cameron Parish's representatives to the board.

Parish Administrator Tina Horn serves as vice-president of the executive committee of the Partnership. She asked the Jury to consider contributing \$10,000 to the Partnership, an amount based on population. All five parishes in SWLA are in the Partnership, and are being asked for the same pro-rated amount.

Locally, the Jury has questions about the status of the parish economic development director, Julie Benoit. Charles Precht asked for clarification at the regular meeting next Monday, after hearing conflicting rumors.

Bill Dore', owner of Global Industries, is concerned about the impact of old oil and gas operations on the ability of new companies to do business

As a result of recent letters to the editor and articles which have appeared in the *American Press* some people have contacted me to ask whether or not the City of Lake Charles is involved in any effort to locate the proposed Hurricane Audrey Museum in Calcasieu Parish.

I want to personally assure you and the members of the Cameron Parish Police Jury that: 1) I do not know of any organized effort to locate this museum in Calcasieu Parish; and 2) as Mayor I have not recommended or suggested that this museum be located in the City or anywhere else in Calcasieu Parish.

It is my understanding that the majority of the Board for the Creole Nature Trail District believes that the museum/interpretive center site should be located in Cameron Parish somewhere along the Nature Trail. As

INSURANCE CHANGES

Parish employee health insurance will see some changes next year, but the details will be decided at Monday's regular voting meeting. Jonathan Dore', of MedPay Express, administrator of the parish's self-insurance fund, explained that a higher than expected number of claims in the past year had put a strain on the fund and recommended changes be made to keep the parish plan solvent.

He gave jurors three options including such items as raising the premium by as much as 8% or eliminating the payout on the health savings plan.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE VACANCY

The Louisiana Supreme Court has asked the Jury to submit a recommendation to fill the vacancy in the position of Ward 2 (Grand Chenier) Justice of the Peace created by the resignation of Catherine Miller. The term would last until October, when an election will be held.

REPAIRS

Jurors considered needed repairs to the Courthouse and the Extension office. The LSU AgCenter Extension office still has nine old style windows that are not energy efficient and not in good condition. Sheriff Theos Duhon has a restroom near his office, not included in the current plumbing repair, that he would like updated. Both projects met with jurors' approval.

Sonny McGee and Darryl Farque took the idea a step further and offered to make a list of needed repairs in the Courthouse. McGee said the state of the public restroom near the court room is a disgrace to the parish, and there are other areas of peeling paint, etc. that should be addressed. A committee of McGee, Farque, and Scott Trahan was appointed to conduct a survey and compile a report.

Lafayette man arrested for DWI

Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Enforcement Division agents arrested a Lafayette man for second offense driving while intoxicated, reckless operation of a motor vehicle and simple battery on July 24.

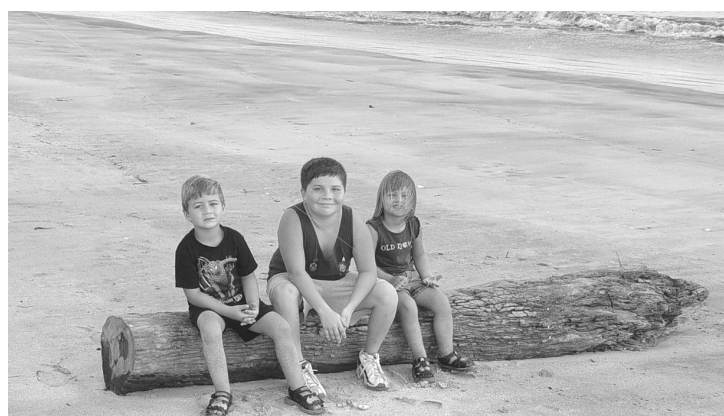

TEAL SEASON SET
The special 9-day teal season which runs statewide has been set by the U.S. Federal Wildlife Service from Sept. 17-25. There is a bag limit of four teals per day, to include a combination of blue-winged, green-winged, and cinnamon teal in any mixture.
We should start to see some blue-winged teals as well as a few pintails coming in next month. We did have lots of teals that stayed and nested.

DECOY BANNED
Arkansas has banned the use of spinning and flapping wing decoys, whether motorized, mechanical or even wind powered. Their state game officials also recommended members of the Mississippi Flyway Council be banned in the region. This could affect us, as they say these decoys attract too many younger birds, especially mallards.
I say you have a limit by law for each day so you still bag that certain limit with or without these decoys, and besides, who looks to see how old or young a duck is before shooting.
As I understand from the information on the duck count, the population of scoup is in real trouble, as well as redhead and canvasbacks. Mallards are down from last year, as well as gadwall and green-winged teals. The count on blue-winged teal is up, wigeon is up, pintail is up and shovelers is way up.

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS
Our lawmakers have reached an agreement to extend daylight savings time, because they say it'll save energy. It would see daylight savings time start on the second Sunday of March (three weeks earlier) and add another week at the end, to stop the first Sunday of November.

Shrimpers have until Aug. 1 to file claims

Qualified domestic shrimp producers who have been affected by foreign dumping of shrimp have until Aug. 1, 2005 to file claims for an offset of qualifying expenditures under the Continued Dumping and Subsidy Offset Act of 2000 commonly known as the "Byrd Amendment" according to the June 1, 2005 Federal Register notice issued by the Bureau of Customs and Border Protection (BCBP).

In consideration of the short application deadline, and in an effort to assist those who may not have received applications, the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF) has posted "Producer's Claim Applications and Certification" forms along with instructions on its Web site at www.wlf.louisiana.gov/shrimp/instructions.pdf, and the application form at www.wlf.louisiana.gov/shrimp/claim.pdf.

Additionally, forms may be obtained by contacting LDWF offices in Baton Rouge, Slidell, New Orleans, Bourg, New Iberia and Lake Charles as well as Sea Grant Extension offices at LSU Ag Center locations in Cut Off, Houma, Belle Chasse, Metairie, Abbeville, Franklin, New Iberia, Lake Charles and Cameron. It is important to note that the sample forms and instructions developed by the Southern Shrimp Alliance (SSA) should be considered as an advisory only and should not be taken as legal advice.

It is unlikely that any funds collected from duty deposits on shrimp imports will be available for distribution this year. However, if funds are available for distribution, claims for 2005 distributions must be received by the BCBP before Aug. 1, 2005.

All claims should be addressed to the Assistant Commissioner, Office of

Finance, Bureau of Customs and Border Protection, Revenue Division, Attention: Leigh Redelman, P.O. Box 68940, Indianapolis, IN 46268 or if using the street address; 6650 Telecom Drive, Suite 100, Indianapolis, IN 46278.

The June 1, 2005, Federal Register notice also identified affected domestic producers including commercial shrimp fishermen, shrimp vessel owners, shrimp dealers and businesses who are potentially eligible to receive a distribution.

A producer is potentially eligible to receive distributions if the producer publicly supported the shrimp antidumping petition by submitting written support of the petition or belonged to an organization that submitted written evidence of support for the petition to the U.S. International Trade Commission (USITC) before Dec. 8, 2004.

The Federal Register notice is available at <http://edocket.access.gpo.gov/2005/pdf/05-10497.pdf>. The document at this link is extremely large and may be difficult to open and download without a high-speed Internet connection.

The BCBP requires that in order to receive distributions from the six countries named in the antidumping duty orders, separate applications

must be submitted for each country-claim.

Applicants are advised that claims require the producer to certify that it remains in operation and continues to produce shrimp; has not been acquired by a company or business that is related to a company which opposed the antidumping investigations; has records to support each qualifying expenditure listed in the certification, and how these qualifying expenditures are determined to be related to the production of shrimp.

Due to the level of detail required in listing qualified expenditures required in, it is recommended that applicants seek accounting advice from professionals.
