'Cameron's' riverboat may go to N. Orleans

Any plans for moving a riverboat to Cameron parish appeared to be completely dead this week after the Isle of Capri Casinos asked permission to move one of its riverboats from Lake Charles to the New Orleans area.

This was the boat that the Isle of Capri had hoped to move to a site on the Sabine River near Johnson Bayou.

Cameron Parish voters had approved the proposal in a referendum but actions by state courts and the Legislature derailed these plans.

Parish Administrator Tina Horn said the Isle of Capri has released the option on the Cameron Parish site and there are no immediate plans to try to secure another boat in the parish.

She said the police jury had more or less decided to not do anything else until the

new riverboat on the Port of Lake Charles property was up and running in Lake Charles. Fear that a Cameron parish site might derail this project was one reason for legislative opposition to the Cameron site.

Under the proposal filed last week with the Louisiana Gaming Control Board the 289-foot Crown riverboat would be relocated from Westlake to a 21-acre site in Jefferson Parish near the Huey P. Long bridge.

The move would have to be approved by Jefferson Parish voters as had been done in Cameron Parish.

This would bring a fourth riverboat casino into the New Orleans gambling market.

The Cameron Parish site had been considered for its close proximity to the Port Arthur-Beaumont-Houston market.

Three arrested after H. B. crime spree

Three Sulphur men were still in the Cameron Parish jail Tuesday after being caught Friday night in possession of a large number of items which had been stolen from the Holly Beach area.

Daniel J. Moak, 19, of 2961 W. Houston River Road, Randall J. Chaisson, 20, of 1017 W. Burton Rd., and Shawn M. Menard, 20, of 1122 W. Verdine, were charged with six counts of burglary of an inhabited dwelling, burglary of a business, five counts of criminal property damage, three counts of felony theft, three counts misdemeanor theft, and criminal trespass. Moak was also charged with underage DWI.

The drama began to unfold Friday evening, Oct. 8, when a man called the Sheriff's Office to report the someone had shot out the window of his truck, setting off the alarm. He saw two male subjects running away from the vehicle, and was able to describe the car they got into.

A short time later, about 10:30 pm, Sheila Peloquin, owner of the Cajun Pass Thru, went into her store which was closed for the night and was surprised to find an intruder.

She was able to reach a phone and called the Sheriff's Office as he dived out of the window. Deputy Paul Sellers, who was just two blocks away on the truck call, immediately responded to the scene.

Peloquin was able to describe the clothing of the man she saw, and a nearby witness who saw the subject drive off described the car and reported the direction it had taken.

Sellers soon caught up with a car matching the description, and was backed up by Hackberry Deputy David French, the car was shut down. Deputies found what appeared to be the stolen goods in the back seat, and further investigation revealed a number of items

later identified as stolen from other victims in the Holly Beach area.

About \$700 worth of liquor and cigarettes were recovered as well as cell phones, a car radio, and a briefcase. Owners of the items have praised the department for recovering their possessions so swiftly.

J. Jones is named to consortium

Sen. Willie Mount announced today that the Southwest Louisiana Health Care Consortium (Region 5) will convene its first meeting on Thursday, Oct. 14. Forty members have been chosen for this consortium, which serves a five-parish region in southwest Louisiana (Allen, Beauregard, Calcasieu, Cameron and Jefferson Davis parishes.)

The consortium meeting will take place at McNeese State University in Lake Charles at 10 a.m. in Farrar Hall. The meeting agenda includes a presentation on the Governor's Health Care Reform Panel and Regional Consortium that will define the roles and responsibilities of the consortium by the Department of Health and Hospitals, other organizational business to formally establish the consortium and scheduling of future meetings and discussions. Members of the public are invited to attend the meeting and offer comment.

One of the Consortium members is Jennifer Jones, Cameron Parish Assistant District Attorney, from Cameron.

Murder suspect extradited

An Ocean Springs, Miss. man, who has been working on a snapper boat out of Cameron, was extradited to Mississippi this week to stand trial on charges of murdering his 15-year-old stepdaughter.

Sean Downing, 33, had been scheduled to go on trial in Cameron District court on Wednesday on charges of aggravated assault for pulling a gun on someone here.

However, Cameron authorities permitted Mississippi officers to return him there immediately with the understanding that if he was ever let go Cameron parish could get him back to answer the assault charge.

Robyn Weatherford was found beaten to death by her mother on Aug. 15 in Ocean Springs. Her stepfather, Downing, disappeared around the same time.

After a six-weeks search, Downing was located in Cameron Parish and Mississippi investigators traveled here on Sept. 28 to serve him with the murder warrant.

Police said the Mississippi Crime Lab matched Downing's palm print to the murder scene.

Downing already had eight warrants for his arrest, seven for false pretense and one for contempt of court.

Grand Lake school contract awarded; work begins soon

Ground can finally be broken on the additions to the Grand Lake School now that the bids have been opened and the contract awarded. Bessette Development was the low bidder out of five companies at \$4,165,000.

Architect Gayle Zembower was delighted with the result, as the project had been estimated at \$4,300,000. Ground breaking could occur as early as the end of October, according to Dr. Doug Chance, Supt. of Schools. The contact calls for completion within 500 working days.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$5,092,000, which includes the construction bid; \$60,000 for change orders and adjustments; \$498,000 for legal, professional, consulting, permitting, site management, and filing fees; \$80,000 for technology (computers, etc.); \$130,000 for furnishings (desks, etc.); \$45,000 for building removal and fencing; and \$114,000 for contingency funds for additions or emergencies.

The project is to be paid for with proceeds from a \$5,000,000 bond issued approved by voters last year and revenue from interest. Chance noted that the interest income estimate is conservative and could go higher, while the cost estimates are liberal and could well be lower.

Grand Lake School will be getting a completely new elementary school and a new cafeteria. The former elementary classrooms will then be available for use by high school classes. The new cafeteria, for all students, will be located between the two sections, keeping the younger and older student populations separate. The building will be clad in brick and have a maroon metal roof.

One unique feature of the cafeteria will be a pull-out stage area which can be used for school programs with the tables moved and chairs set up.

Zembower, who has twice before designed building improvements for Grand Lake that were not funded, remarked that it seemed "the third time's the charm," and he looks forward to finally getting the project built.

In other business, school section 16-14-12 was leased to

high bidder Gene Reynolds for \$1203.10. The Board voted to advertise three sections for oil and gas leases. No bids were received on surplus school buses.

The Board raised the cost of school breakfasts and lunches for guests to \$1.50 and \$3 respectively, to reflect the actual cost of the meals. There will be no change in meal costs to teachers or students.

In an effort to resolve property boundary issues at Johnson Bayou School, the Superintendent was given authority to seek two appraisals on "the parking lot, playground extensions and any other land not owned by the School Board at the Johnson Bayou site." Board President Clifton Morris said this will include approximately 11.2 acres and allow for a regulation softball field.




(Louisiana Sea Grant) Shrimp iMonelli

This month's recipe was developed by Brian Blanchard, owner and chef of iMonelli Restaurant in Lafayette. Be sure to use the freshest Parmesan cheese possible. If it is dried out, it will make the sauce "gritty". For pasta, I used fettuccini, but use the pasta of your choice.

- 1 lb. large shrimp
- 1 1/2 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt

- 1 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- 1 1/2 tsp. crushed oregano
- 1 1/2 tsp. crushed garlic
- 1/3 cup white wine
- 1/3 cup heavy cream
- 3 tbsp. fresh Parmesan cheese.

pasta of your choice
Peel shrimp and saute' them for about 45 minutes (until pink) in olive oil. Add nutmeg, salt, black pepper, oregano, garlic, and wine. Bring to a boil for 2 minutes. remove from heat and remove shrimp from pan. Add cream and Parmesan cheese. Bring to a boil. Add shrimp and simmer about 5 minutes until thickened. Serve over your favorite pasta.

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Lagniappe Two Retirement Home Living Notes

Last weekend we went to Natchitoches to see my great-grandchild McCall Matt and family and to see the parade of plantation homes that Natchitoches has put on for the last 50 years. We also toured the "Steel Magnolia" home, where the motion picture was filmed.

We had fun remembering the different scenes from the motion picture that was filmed there and made us want to see the film again.

We were impressed by the tour guides in each room giving us the history of the house. They were dressed in period dresses of the time. The homes were filled with antique furniture.

Natchitoches is the oldest city in the Louisiana Purchase and has much history.

One of the plantations we visited was "Cherokee". It has been in the family for 150 years and family members were there from all over the United States to take part in the tour. One guide told us that she had just met a 7th cousin she had never met before.

Cherokee is part of a Spanish land grant issued to Philippe Frederique and Jacques Faure in 1793 and has been in the family of Robert Calvert Murphy since 1878. It is built of "bousil-

lage" (mud mixed with moss and deer hair.) It contained a bedroom once called "strangers room", where strangers could stay for a night while traveling past. It contained an armoire almost 10 feet tall, that had been made by slaves on Cane River. The purpose of such a tall piece of furniture was to escape making a closet to be taxed on. Since homeowners were taxed on rooms, this was considered furniture, and closets were considered as rooms.

A duel was fought at the rear of the plantation in which my granddaughter's husband Jacque's, Matt's ancestor, participated. This made a tour of this plantation more interesting to us.

We had lunch at a little restaurant named "Merciu Boucou" (French for "have a good day") where we met Peggy Plunkett, the woman who Oprah Winfree made a special trip to Natchitoches to see. Peggy was visiting friends and attended Oprah's television show and hollered out to her that "everyone in Natchitoches loves Oprah." Oprah found out her name and flew to Natchitoches to see if it was true. Northwestern University was having a football game that day and Oprah was treated royally by the crowd, and Janay got to meet her.

Geneva's first 'Lagniappe' was printed 47 years ago

(EDITOR'S NOTE-- Some readers of Geneva Griffith's column-- "Lagniappe Two-- Retirement Living Notes"-- may wonder where the title came from. In 1957, Geneva started writing a column which we entitled "Lagniappe...with the Refugees," in which she reported from Lake Charles on how the Cameron Parish refugees from Hurricane Audrey, which was June 27, 1957, were faring. She continued the column for several months until most Cameron folks had returned home. The following is a portion of that first Lagniappe column printed in the Pilot.)

(EDITOR'S NOTE-- Wars, pestilence or storms...life goes on. And so it does in Cameron Parish. Where things are still not normal but well on their way. The Pilot, too, is a little more of its

old self this week as it welcomes back its Oak Grove correspondent, Geneva Griffith. There's only one thing changed...with Oak Grove folks still scattered far and wide, Geneva is now a "reporter at large. If you have any news on any Cameron Parish folks you can give her a ring in the evenings at the above number in Lake Charles.)

Have you heard? They are calling Greenwich Village in Lake Charles Refugee Village because there are so many Hurricane Audrey refugees living there.

EVERYWHERE you go in Lake Charles, whether it is to the grocery store, downtown etc., you will see little groups of people gathered together, talking, and 10-1, it is a group of Cameron residents. Of course, you go up and join them to ask about their families, where they are staying, and "what's the latest". Right now the main topic

THE MURREY WESTS are living in a trailer furnished by Forest Oil Co. for them. Eleanor said she knew what the sardines felt like now. Incidentally, Eleanor has one of the most complete "refugee address books" to date. Every time she meets up with someone she gets their address and phone number. I haven't had time to compile one myself and am not worrying about it because all I have to do to find someone is to ask Eleanor.

IT SEEMS THAT Tad Davis resurrected an old wringer type washing machine from somewhere and set it up in her garage for family and friends to use. We're calling it "Davis' Washateria."

THE CAMERON Baptist Church held services in the local church Sunday for the first time since the storm.

THE CAMERON and Grand Chenier Methodists are meeting in the McNeese Methodist student center in back of McNeese College for their Sunday services.



Development of football

American football, distinct type of football that developed in the United States in the 19th century from soccer (association football) and rugby football.

Played by professionals and amateurs (generally male college or high school teams), football is one of the most popular American sports, attracting thousands of participants and millions of spectators annually.

The forerunner of

American football may have been a game played by the ancient Greeks, called harpaston. In this game there was no limit to the number of players. The object was to move a ball across a goal line by kicking, throwing, or running with it.

Classical literature contains detailed accounts of the game, including its rougher elements, such as ferocious tackling.


Most modern versions of football, however, originated in England, where a form of the game was known in the 12th century. In subsequent centuries football became so popular that various English

monarchs, including Edward II and Henry VI, forbade the game because it took interest away from the military sport of archery.

By the middle of the 19th century football had split into two distinct entities. Still popular today, these two sports included the football association game, or soccer (the word being a slang adaptation of the three letters, s-o-c, in Association), and rugby, in which players ran with the ball and tackled.

Modern football evolved out of these two sports.

Cameron Parish murders included in Ross' new book

"Crimes Of The Past, In South Louisiana" is a new book by Nola Mae Ross which tells the complete and true stories of 14 famous crimes in South Louisiana from 1896 to 1940, ending with the true story of the murder by Toni Jo Henry.

Compiled from newspapers, court records, successions, obituaries and Supreme Court Summations, this book also contains 138 photographs of judges, district attorneys, sheriffs, attorneys, state police captains, victims and murderers.

It shows the great difference in the way murders were solved in real life a century ago. At that time it seemed that the person who was standing closest to the victim was automatically chosen as the murderer. There was no confusion about who else might be guilty, no wasting time checking alibis of other bystanders, no searching for vital clues. Circumstantial evidence was usually the final method of conviction.

Unbelievable is the biased of a judge, attorneys and some jurors. In one case the Ku Klux Klan played a major part in the prosecution of the

alleged murderers. At the Toni Jo trial there was open antagonism and finger signs from the audience.

These crimes took place in Calcasieu, Cameron, Jeff Davis and Beauregard Parishes. Every bit of information that was available on these crimes was collected by the author and turned into a very readable and carefully researched book.

Ross will be signing copies

of the book at the St. Luke-Simpson Craft Fair, Oct. 15 and 16, as well as at The Louisiana Market on Dec. 4 and 5. A soft cover book, with 138 pictures of local law enforcement people, it sells for \$15 plus tax.

The book is also available at Waldenbooks, Louisiana Market and from the author, who is a native of, and still lives in Lake Charles, by calling 477-6243 or emailing nolaross@bellsouth.net.

Cameron Parish crimes included in the book are:

*The shooting of Dr. D. A. Savant of Creole by Eusebe Theriot on Dec. 12, 1896 in Grand Chenier following an argument. Theriot went to prison and was poisoned two years later in prison.

*The shooting of James Frederick Hebert by John Yoakum in Cameron Parish in October, 1902. Hebert did not die and was subsequently charged with rape and was sentenced to die. This was later commuted to life by Gov. W. W. Heard. He only served a few years.

*The shooting of John Springer of Lake Charles and A. A. Byrd of Nederland, Tex. by Ned Harvey of Port Arthur in December 1924. He was hanged in Lake Charles on Feb. 25, 1925.



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

hope that Audrey Memorial, the former Negro school on the front ridge, will be made into a Junior High School eventually.

Smith said that he was proud that when HEW officials were in the parish they were very complimentary of the local schools system. He was told that Cameron Parish, to their knowledge, was the only school system in the United States that has every school completely air-conditioned.

A student teacher program operated out of McNeese State University has started. This is the first time the local school system has been used in this training program. Also an observation course will be participated in by McNeese education students.

The school finances were discussed by Smith. He said that Cameron Parish gets less money from the state than any other parish in Louisiana, due to the oil revenues on the school sections. He pointed out that we are being penalized because Cameron was able to hang on to their 16th sections for the schools during the depression when many school board sold theirs.

Federal Surplus Equipment Purchases

Ms. Leslie Trahan presented the Board with invoices for new equipment purchased under the Federal Equipment Purchasing Program. The first invoice was for a DynaRad Portable X-Ray and the second was for a DinaMap pulse-ox unit. The new equipment is currently installed and operating in the X-Ray department and emergency room.

Patient Overpayment Update

Ms. Brenda Boudreaux reported to the Board that she is continuing to research the old Swing-Bed patient overpayments and has identified approximately \$11,400 that needs to be paid. Ms. Boudreaux also stated that she has also identified many errors in the information and in some cases overpayments that have already been paid, or are no longer valid.

Ms. Boudreaux also recommended that since the patients were already in the Hospital computers that it would be easier to make the overpayment checks out of that computer and the District would reimburse the Hospital's account for the total of the checks.

Disposal of old Equipment

On a motion by Mr. Fawvor, seconded by Mr. Theriot it was moved to dispose of obsolete copiers, equipment and supplies. The motion carried. The copiers had been put out for bid with no response as of the previous meeting. The remaining equipment and supplies had been determined to have no value to the Hospital or the Board, and any remaining equipment located at the old Health Complex with any usefulness was to be moved to the Hospital.

New Business Management Report

Ms. Leslie Trahan reported to the Board that PACER Healthcare had purchased the following new equipment to enhance Hospital operations: A new truck for the maintenance department; a new van for the Partial Day Project at Calcasieu Oaks; Hematology Analyzer and Coagulation Analyzer for the Hospital Lab Dept.; Electronic blood pressure cuffs for the emergency room and nurse's station; Commercial refrigerator for the Hospital's Dietary Dept.; and finally new air conditioning units for the Emergency Room at the Hospital and also one for Calcasieu Oaks.

She also reported that the following Plant & Equipment Improvements should begin shortly: New radiology room including fully digital X-Ray equipment; New Emergency Room stretchers from an HRSA Grant, and finally improvements to the exterior and grounds of the hospital.

Ms. Trahan also reported that the Louisiana Department of Health & Hospital Health Standards Survey Exit Conference on August 25, 2004 had reported the following: All previously noted deficiencies had been cleared. No additional deficiencies were found after a multi-day survey was performed, and that the Surveyor had commended the staff on the excellent report and the speed at which all deficiencies had been corrected.

Finally she reported that PACER had instituted a new Hospital wide Employee Bonus Plan which would take place four times per year based upon utilization at the Calcasieu Oaks Facility. She also stated that August was one of the bonus months and that those checks were currently being sent out.

On a motion by Mr. Fawvor, seconded by Mr. Theriot the Board accepted the Management Company Report for the month of September. The motion carried.

Review of Lease Agreement & Amendments

Ms. Jones reported to the Board that a question had been raised in the public concerning the section of the Lease Assignment and Amendments with PACER Healthcare regarding possible sale of the Hospital and it's assets to PACER. The rumor being circulated is that PACER is allowed to buy the Hospital at whatever price they choose and that the sale required no approval from anyone. Ms. Jones then read from the lease agreement that there is an option which would allow PACER to purchase the premises and movable property for ifair market value. The lease goes on to say that ifair market value shall be determined by either mutual consent or the average of three independent appraisals. The lease further states that the sale of the premises shall be subject to all legal requirements existing at the time that the option is exercised. Ms. Jones stated that presently such approval would be required by the following bodies: the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District, the Cameron Parish Police Jury, the Attorney General of the State Of Louisiana, the Federal Bankruptcy Court, and finally the voters residing within the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District's taxing authority.

Ms. Jones then stated that it had been alleged in the public that Mr. Merchant's signature had been forged on the Lease Assignment and Amendments, whereupon she asked Mr. Merchant if he had actually signed the documents. Mr. Merchant stated that he had signed the documents and that those allegations were completely false.

Louisiana Rural Healthcare Meeting

Ms. Jones then reported to the Board that a meeting by Louisiana Rural Healthcare representatives would be held at the Hospital on September 9, 2004 at 5:15 PM. She stated various methods of funding Hospital improvements would be discussed along with grant writing and requirements and the formation of a 501(c)3 non-profit group. She asked that the Board members please attend and bring as many interested persons as possible.

Chadwell Property Lease

Ms. Jones reported to the Board that she had been approached by a company interested in leasing the property left to the District by the Chadwell Estate. Ms. Jones informed the Board that the process of leasing by a government entity is different than an individual. First the Board must receive an applications letter and then pass a resolution before the lease can be entered into. She further stated that the application letter would not be available until next month.

Upon further review of the Chadwell Estate succession it was discovered that the District owned property that had been included in another producing well, however because the property was left off of the succession, the District has never received it's royalty payments.

On a motion by Ms. LeBlanc, seconded by Mr. Theriot it was moved that Ms. Jones be authorized to consult with Mr. Leon Comeaux to research making a claim with the oil company now producing the well for back payments. The motion carried.

On a motion by Mr. Fawvor, seconded by Mr. Theriot, authority was given to the Chairman to sign all documents regarding the leasing of properties owned by the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District. The motion carried.

On a motion by Mr. Fawvor, seconded by Mr. Theriot the following Resolution was offered and adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District the Docket Item No. 5 under New Business from the September 2, 2004 meeting be approved, said item acknowledging receipt of and approving an application from Allen & Kirmse, Ltd. Dated _____, 2004, for an oil, gas and other minerals lease covering certain undivided interests owned by the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District (although acquired in Cameron Parish public records in the name iSouth Cameron Memorial Hospital) in Section 30, T14S-R8W, Cameron Parish, Louisiana, all as set forth and described in said application, a copy of which is attached hereto, and further authorizing and requesting the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources, Office of Mineral Resources, State Mineral Board, to act on behalf of the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District in advertising and leasing said lands and undivided interests for exploration, development and production of oil, gas and other minerals, subject to and including the specific conditions set forth herein below, and further authorizing Rich Merchant, the Chairman, to endorse in favor of the Office of Mineral Resources, Allen & Kirmse, Ltd.'s check made payable to the Board of Commissioners of the Lower Cameron Memorial Hospital Service District in the amount of \$400.00, all in accordance with the provisions of LA R.S. 30.153

LIGHTHOUSE EVENT

The second split, opening of dove season that's supposed to be the best, was hampered by all the rain caused from tropical storm Matthew. I had been seeing lots of doves, but at noon Saturday, it was a slow process to find a dove flying.

Although a few doves were reported bagged, it would have been better if the 3 to 5 inches of rain had not fallen. Let's hope they didn't leave for good and they will return as things get back to normal.

This Saturday, Oct. 16 the 6th Annual Sabine Pass Lighthouse Hayride and fun day will take place. This will be held at the Crain Brothers Ranch in Johnson Bayou.

The hayride trailers will leave at 9:30 a.m. from the ranch, but there will also be live music, food, dancing (live band), auctions, country store and much more, including something for the hunters. The Cajun Clay Crackers will hold a trap shoot for youth and adults starting at 8:30 a.m. with the shoot-offs at 5 p.m. For more information call Carolyn at 775-5046 or Andy at 569-2359.

RED SNAPPER

Red snappers have been said to be the most overfished species in the Gulf of Mexico and the south Atlantic. These

attractive, bright colored fish grow to over 30 pounds and yes, are very good to eat. Both recreational and commercial fishermen highly prize the fish.

There is a great deal of talk from both recreational and commercial fishermen about the size limits, 16 inches for recreational and 15 inch for commercial. It seems both are killing lots of red snappers in the 13 to 14 inch category either from bringing them up fast from a deep depth or from gut hooking.

It seems recreational anglers should be able to keep their 4 fish limit of say 12 inches minimum and save lots of these fish from dying and besides, that's the best eating anyhow.

Same goes for the commercial fishermen, as they have a quota for the year, fishing only the first 10 days of each month. When you order red snapper from a cafe, look at the size, it's not a large red snapper.

I understand Mexico has a 12 inch limit, but the way they operate, there's probably no size limit at all.

The recreational season on red snapper will end Oct. 24 for 2004, and some commercial fishermen tell me their quota will be filled by November, if the weather holds out.

BOATING

Although there's not as much fishing during the winter months, rivers and lakes are usually rougher, and there's still lots of boating activity for hunting season.

A reminder that there's a new law that establishes "No Wake" zones within 300 feet of a public boat launch or a docking facility associated with a public boat launch. "No Wake" means that vessels are to operate at a bare steerage speed, the slowest speed the vessel can travel to produce minimum water waves behind the vessel.

It is also wise to wear your life jacket even while hunting, as narrow trails, rough lakes, and cold water can take your life if thrown or falling overboard.

Boating statistics for 2002 for the United States show that there were 5705 boating incidents, with 4062 injured and 750 killed. Seventy percent of fatalities were caused by drowning, and eighty-five percent who drown, were not wearing life jackets.

The number one reason given for not wearing a life jacket, was lack of comfort. Hunters and anglers believe that life jackets are too hot, uncomfortable, too bulky.

This is surprising as there's a new life jacket on the market that wears like a pair of suspenders that are inflatable. A popular name is sponders with a rip-cord activated vest and it does not interfere with casting.

RAIN FISH

A ranger at Louisiana's Gulf Island National Seashore was recently pelted with small, icy fish while checking minnow traps from the park's pier. Officials at the J. S. Scott Marine Education Center say the bizarre occurrence was probably caused when a nearby thunderstorm pulled the fish into the clouds, where they were coated with ice until they became heavy enough to fall.

I often wondered why a roadside ditch could be dry and get a weather change and heavy rain, and you'll see small fish in the ditch. I guess it's not only "Pennies from Heaven", there's also "Fish from Heaven."

AREA NEWS

I'm sorry I don't have much of a fish or hunting story, but this weather has put fresh water back into the Big Lake area as well as the rivers and that will slow salt-water fishing down. This will hold true on freshwater fishing except Lacassine Refuge pool fishing. The cloudy, rainy weather is perfect to fish the pool for bass, overcast skies have always been the best time to fish the pool.

I think the bow hunters as well as the muzzleloader hunters will do better, as this heavy rain put water into our marshes and the deer will come to our ridges. This will also hold true for our deer gun season (still hunt) opening this Saturday, Oct. 16. Come to think about it,

Four fishermen cited for white shrimp violations

Four commercial fishermen have been cited by Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Enforcement Division agents for allegedly violating provisions pertaining to the count on white shrimp in two separate incidents in Cameron Parish.

Michael W. Daigle, 52, of Hackberry and A. J. Elkin, 69, of Lake Charles, were cited for taking and possessing undersized white shrimp on August 25 after enforcement agents boarded the fishing vessel "Southern Comfort" which was engaged in trawling in the Calcasieu Ship Channel. Undersized white shrimp were found on board. Samples of the catch were weighed and counted to determine the total number of white shrimp per pound. The results revealed an average count of 150 white shrimp to the pound. A total of 215 pounds of shrimp were seized and sold for \$43.00, to be held on account pending disposition of the case.

Randall K. Richard, 43, and Ronald T. Truxillo, 57, both of Sulphur, were cited for taking and possessing under-

sized white shrimp on Sept. 21 after agents boarded the "Daddy Rabbit," trawling in the Calcasieu Ship Channel. The count on shrimp aboard this vessel was 135 white shrimp per pound. A total of 250 pounds of white shrimp valued at \$62.50 were seized and sold.

It is illegal to take or possess white shrimp smaller than 100 per pound in Louisiana waters. This size restriction applies to taking or possessing white shrimp aboard a vessel, except during the period from Oct. 15 through the third Monday in December when there shall be no possession count on saltwater white shrimp taken or possessed.

Taking or possessing undersized white shrimp carries a penalty of up to \$500 in fines, no more than 90 days in jail, or both, plus court costs and forfeiture of anything seized.

Agents participating in the cases were Lieutenant Jesse Savoie, Sergeant David Liles, Senior Agents Keith Aucoin, Scott Fontenot, Steven Vidrine, and Joey James, and Cadet Wendel Vaughn.

Fishing & boat activities to close at Sabine Friday

Refuge Manager, Terence Delaine, announced today that Sabine National Wildlife Refuge's interior marshes and waterways will close to all fishing and boating activities at sunset on Friday, Oct. 15. These areas will remain closed throughout the wintering waterfowl season to protect and maintain waterfowl concentrations.

West Cove Canal will remain open for boat access to Calcasieu Lake via the salt water boat launch at West Cove Recreational Area, however, it is closed to all other activities.

Only designated roadside recreation areas along Highway 27 remain open year round for cast netting during the open inland shrimp season, fishing, and crabbing. All refuge regulations remain in effect. The refuge will reopen to interior fishing and boating activities at sunrise on March 15.

Recreational paddling via non-motorized watercraft including pirogues, kayaks and canoes is permitted throughout the year in three designated areas. Areas include Management Units 1A, 1B, and West Cove, north of the refuge headquarters. Units 1A and 1B are freshwa-

ter impoundments that may be entered via the 1A/1B recreational area. West Cove Unit is a tidally influenced brackish marsh traversed by canals, bayous, lakes, and ponds.

This area may be entered via the launch east of the water control structure at Hog Island Gully Recreational Area. West Cove paddling area includes everything accessible to the north and south of Hog Island Gully Canal.

Please remember, although these areas are open to paddling they are closed to fishing, crabbing and cast netting from Oct. 15, through March 14.

The Wetland Walkway and the Blue Goose Trail are open for hiking, interpretation, environmental education, wildlife observation, and photography year round from sunrise to sunset. Visitor Center hours are 7 a.m. - 4 p.m. weekdays and Noon to 4 p.m. on weekends. It is closed on all federal holidays.
