New Stations of the Cross are installed

Our Lady Star of the Sea Church in Cameron, which held its first Holy Mass since Hurricane Rita in June, has recently installed fourteen stained glass Stations of the Cross. The panels, depicting scenes from the trial and crucifixion of Jesus, were created by Frank Thompson of the Open House Community near Gillis.

According to the church newsletter, the Open House Community is based on the model of the early Christian Church, with members pooling resources, sharing

expenses, taking meals together, and home schooling children. The Thompson's son is studying for the priesthood in Connecticut.

Thompson's stained glass windows add bright color to the clear, translucent "rain glass" windows that surround the restored sanctuary. Every third rain glass window has been replaced with a stained glass panel.

Each window costs \$1000, and church members may donate a window in memory of a loved one by calling Carla Richard at 542-4795. A bronze plaque will be attached to the window of choice.

Only four races still remain on ballot

Cameron Parish voters will be faced with a much shorter ballot when they vote in the runoff election on Saturday, Nov. 17.

Only two police jury races, the 25th Senatorial race and the Louisiana Attorney General's race remain on the ballot.

In Police Jury District 6, the Cameron area, Kirk Burleigh and Bryon "Goose" Richard are in the runoff.

In Police Jury District 2, the Hackberry area, Anthony "Dino" Hicks and Steve Racca are in the runoff.

All four are newcomers. The incumbents in the two districts did not seek re-election.

In the 25th Senatorial District race Dan "Blade" Morrish and "Gil" Pinac are in the runoff.

The incumbent, Jerry Theunissen, was unable to seek re-election due to term limits.

Early voting for the Nov. 17 election will be from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. starting Saturday, Nov. 3, and the week of Nov. 5-10, Monday through Saturday. This voting will be done in the Registrar of Voters' office behind the courthouse.

A second statewide runoff was cancelled for the Commissioner of Agriculture race after incumbent Bob Odom withdrew from the race.

Cheniere to give checks to agencies

Houston-based Cheniere Energy will present checks to Cameron Parish tax authorities during a ceremony with elected officials to celebrate what no other company operating in Louisiana has ever done - accelerate its property tax payments.

In a landmark action this summer, Cheniere Energy requested that the Louisiana State Legislature pass a bill that would allow the accelerated payment of the Company's parish property tax. The ceremony will celebrate the first payments to 11 individual Cameron Parish taxing authorities, money that will be made available to continue the rebuilding efforts after Hurricane Rita.

A presentation ceremony will be held at 10:30 a.m., Friday, Nov. 2 in the Cameron Parish Courthouse. A tour of the Sabine Pass LNG Terminal site will be held at 2 p.m., for parish officials and news media. Several state congressmen and senators are expected to attend.

When open in 2nd Quarter 2008, Cheniere's Sabine Pass LNG terminal will be among the first constructed in the United States since the 1970s. Upon completion, Sabine Pass LNG terminal will be among the largest in the world as measured by regasification capacity.

Playground to be built Saturday

This Saturday, Nov. 3, in just one day, 150 volunteers from the Creole community, lower Cameron Parish, Recreation District #7, and AmeriCares, and organizers from KaBOOM! will create a new, safe playground at the Creole Ball Park, located at 204 East Creole Highway.

The playground, based on drawings provided by children who attended a Design Day event in September, will provide a safe place to play for the children of Creole and lower Cameron parish.

It will include swings, spring riders, spiral and racer slides, silo climber, something called Lillypods, and Freddie Firetruck. There is a catwalk, various other climbers, solar system panel, and something called Rockblocks with Helix.

Games and a map of the United States will be painted on the asphalt. Benches and picnic tables will be built for parents who are watching children play.

Volunteers are still needed to make sure the playground is completed on time. Recruitment Chairman Margaret Wolfe says she has

Library receives bookmobile donated by Gates Foundation

The Cameron Parish Library System received the keys last Friday to a brand new 40 foot long book/tech mobile, courtesy of the Gates Foundation. The new traveling library was delivered to Johnson Bayou, where it will serve as the local branch until a new library is built. It replaces an older donated bookmobile, which will be moved to Creole, providing service to that community for the first time since Hurricane Rita.

The new vehicle is to be fitted with a satellite antenna before returning to Johnson Bayou to be filled with \$25,000 worth of new books, DVDs and audiobooks, also provided by the Gates Foundation. It will have two public computer stations, fax and copying capability, a flat screen TV for classes, a handicapped lift, and a microwave and mini-refrigerator for the staff. An awning will provide shade for patrons who choose to sit outside and access the wireless internet.

The vehicle, built by Matthews Specialty Vehicles, is constructed on a 40' motor home chassis. It has twice the space of any previous bookmobile in the parish. Parish Librarian Charlotte Trosclair is looking forward to taking it to area schools, as was done in the past.

The new bookmobile is Cameron Parish's to keep, unlike the temporary buildings in which the Cameron and Grand Chenier branches are housed. The graphics on the side, designed by Annette and Alice Duhon, show an alligator and other local critters enjoying books and a logo which states there is "Something for Everyone at Your Library."

The Southeastern Library Network (SOLINET) administered the grant from the Gates Foundation and worked with the local library and the manufacturer to make sure the new bookmobile provides the most service possible.

Road project

Parish revenues will be good in 2008

Police Jurors discussed ways to spend various grants, royalties, and tax revenues expected in the coming year during their first budget meeting held Monday afternoon. Parish accountant Darrell Williams told the Jury that Road Royalty funds will reach \$5 million this year, and with oil prices as high as they have been, it is possible next year will be just as good.

The parish will receive \$8.4 million in Community Development Block Grants from the Louisiana Recovery Authority, which is earmarked for the Cameron Square project. In addition, a bond issue based on the Cheniere LNG PILOT (prepayment in lieu of taxes) will provide approximately \$7 million.

The use of the PILOT funds was debated by jurors, with some wanting to spend part of the funds on road resurfacing and blacktopping. Jury President Darryl Farque pointed to the state capital outlay budget, which included millions of dollars for Cameron Parish projects, but

most of it is in priority 5, which may or may not ever be allocated.

A request from the Road and Bridge Maintenance department to budget \$475,000 worth of new equipment was tentatively approved.

Jurors will have another budget meeting next Monday at 4 p.m., before the regular voting meeting. The final budget will be adopted in December.

At the agenda meeting which followed the budget

meeting, jurors discussed a request to extend Calcasieu Drive at Rutherford Beach another 200 feet to reach a new landowner's lot. The right of way was accepted as a parish road by the Police Jury in the 1960s, but was only developed as far as lots had been sold. For years there were no other sales, so the road was never extended.

Jurors decided to wait for more information, concerned that extending this road would lead to a spate of similar requests. Currently, developers are required to build roads in new subdivisions to parish standards before acceptance into the parish road maintenance system.

Many gravel roads which were accepted prior to the new requirements are still waiting for hardsurfacing. And in some districts, roads which were previously hardsurfaced have deteriorated back to gravel. Jurors hope to get some relief next year through the budget.

Jennifer Jones asked jurors to consider increasing the amount allocated to move the South Cameron Rural Health Clinic to the parish development north of Grand Lake. The earlier estimate of cost had been \$32,000, but actual bids came to \$47,000, an increase of \$15,000.

Jones explained that rent on the lot where the clinic is presently located is \$2000 per month, down from \$4000 per month last year. Locating the clinic at the parish site will reduce costs and allow more money to go into hospital operations. The clinic itself is self-supporting, she said. The request for funds was regarded favorably by the jurors, who will vote on it next week.

The move is expected to take only about 10 days. Jurors hope South Cameron Memorial Hospital will be in operation before the clinic goes out of service. Jones said the hospital is complete except for railings, canopies and landscaping. It only needs state inspection and certification in order to open, which she hopes will be in three weeks.

The grand opening will be delayed until the above items are installed, hopefully in early January.

Parish Administrator Tina Horn announced an orientation for new police jurors which will be held in Baton Rouge on Dec. 6. She said there will be information on ethics, procedures, and new laws which would benefit all jurors, new and old.

She also announced that representatives of Cheniere LNG will be at the Court House on Friday for the presentation of the first checks in the PILOT program. Eleven entities are to receive payment in lieu of taxes which won't come due for 12 years. The payments will come every year for ten years, and are designed to help the parish recover from Hurricane Rita.

New book tells history of Rockeller Wildlife Refuge

A fascinating new book about the history of Tabasco sauce and the McIlhenny family, also tells about the origin of the Rockefeller Wildlife Refuge, located in Cameron and Vermilion Parishes.

Tabasco sauce is probably the best known Louisiana product in the world. It has a very interesting history dating back to the Civil War. The book is "McIlhenny's Gold," and was written by Jeffrey Rothfeder.

Here is what the book has to say about the Rockefeller Refuge:

The connection between the Rockefellers and the McIlhennys dated back to the early twentieth century, when Edward McIlhenny and his friend Charles Willis Ward, a wealthy East Coast bird-watcher and flower enthusiast, hatched a plan to convert a series of islands in the Gulf

of Mexico into Louisiana's first wildlife refuges.

Seeking funding, the pair approached philanthropist Olivia Sage, the widow of industrialist Russell Sage. It took some coaxing, but she eventually purchased a 75,000-acre island in Vermilion Bay and deeded it to the the state as a sanctuary.

Sage introduced McIlhenny to John D. Rockefeller Jr. In 1914, after a series of letters, John D., through the Rockefeller Foundation, agreed to take over a portion of McIlhenny's \$212,000 mortgage on 86,000 acres in the Gulf.

Five years later, that property was transferred to Louisiana and renamed the Rockefeller Wildlife Refuge, a seaside research center with 200 miles of canals and bay-ous and one of the most biologically diverse animal populations in the nation.

Holly Beach sewer project financing is now assured

The Cameron Parish Office of Planning & Development announced the successful inclusion of Holly Beach and its planned sewer system in the State's coffers at its recent hearing of the Louisiana Bond Commission.

This hearing authorized the movement of engineering and design for the wetlands assimilation system at Holly Beach that is scheduled to be central to the future regional sewer system planned along the Gulf Coast.

A cash award of \$500,000 in Priority 2 and a non-cash line of credit in Priority 5 funds will allow the Parish to accelerate work on the sewer project.

Ernest Broussard, Executive Director of Planning & Development said, "The successful approval of Holly Beach sewer allows us to resubmit under next year's appropriations for \$5M for Cameron Square and \$18M for the Cameron Loop Dredging. This is a continuing process the leadership of the Parish will be maintaining its engagement from this point on."

SUMMIT

In a separate matter,

Cameron Parish Planning & Development announces a successful summit briefing with members of the SWLA LNG groups on behalf of the Parish to discuss features of mutual benefit for the industry.

Present at the briefing were Cheniere Energy representing Creole Trail as well as the soon to open Sabine Pass project, Sempra's Cameron LNG facility in Hackberry, Lake Charles LNG, and both Parish and Port officials.

An assembly of the West Cameron Port Authority and the West Calcasieu Port Authority was recently held.

Representatives and staff from both ports gave overviews of what their organization and development agenda entailed, while both underscored a need to maintain a working relationship in order to pursue discretionary port funding and assistance from Departments of Homeland Security, Energy, and Defense. Both ports were represented by their authorized agents - Ernest Broussard, representing West Cameron, as well as Lynn Hohensee on behalf of the West Cal Group.

Wildlife refuges announces waterfowl hunting rules

Sabine and Lacassine National Wildlife Refuges will be open to public waterfowl hunting throughout the Louisiana western zone duck and goose seasons, including the youth only waterfowl hunts. Duck and goose season is open Nov. 10 to Dec. 2 and Dec. 15 to Jan. 20. Youth only hunts are Nov. 3 and Nov. 4. Hunting on each refuge may only occur on designated hunt days.

Sabine NWR is open for hunting Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday. Hunters can enter the refuge and launch at 3 a.m. Shooting hours end at 12 p.m. each day. Boats may enter the refuge hunt areas from West Cove Recreation Area or through Burton Canal via Black Bayou. Walk-in hunters and hunters launching small boats may access Hunt Unit E by driving on Vastar Road.

Lacassine NWR is open for hunting Wednesday through Sunday. Hunters may enter the refuge at 4 a.m. Shooting hours end at 12 p.m. each day. Hunters may hunt the portion of the refuge south of the Gulf Intercoastal Waterway and between the Mermentau River and the east bank of the Lacassine Bayou (excluding the Duck Pond area and Unit B). There is a federal order prohibiting waterfowl hunting on that portion of Lacassine Bayou that flows through the refuge.

Youths, 15 and under, must have proof of successful completion of a Hunter Safety Course to hunt on the National Wildlife Refuges. All youths attending the hunt must be under the supervision of an adult age 21 or over. Each adult may supervise no more than two youths.

Hunters are encouraged to familiarize themselves with hunting areas prior to hunting. Hunt unit conditions and access may change each year depending upon weather, growth and expansion of vegetation, and tidal flow.

Sabine is open for scouting Nov. 5-9 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. Lacassine is open for scouting Nov. 5-9 from one hour before sunrise until one

hour after sunset. All firearms and blind material are prohibited while scouting.

Only portable blinds are allowed on the refuge. All boats, blinds, and decoys must be removed immediately following each day's hunt.

All refuge hunters are required to possess a refuge-hunting permit. The Southwest Louisiana National Wildlife Refuge Complex Hunting Regulations 2007-08 brochure will serve as the required permit when it has been signed and dated. The brochure may be obtained at the refuge hunt kiosks located at each refuge or by stopping by the Cameron Prairie or Lacassine offices.

Each hunting party is required to fill out a Waterfowl Harvest Data Form after each hunt and drop it in one of the designated hunt drop boxes.

Every party, whether successful or not, needs to complete the Data Form.

This information provides us with a means to evaluate hunter effort on the refuge.

For additional information about waterfowl hunting on your Southwest Louisiana National Wildlife Refuges please call 598-2216.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is the principal federal agency responsible for conserving, protecting, and enhancing fish, wildlife, and plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people.

The Service manages the 95-million-acre National Wildlife Refuge System that encompasses more than 540 national wildlife refuges, thousands of small wetlands, and other special management areas. It also operates 70 national fish hatcheries, 64 fishery resource offices and 78 ecological services field stations.

The agency enforces federal wildlife laws, administers the Endangered Species Act, manages migratory bird populations, restores nationally significant fisheries, conserves and restores wildlife habitat such as wetlands, and helps foreign governments with their conservation efforts.

The agency also oversees the Federal Aid program that distributes hundreds of millions of dollars in excise taxes on fishing and hunting equipment to state fish and wildlife agencies.

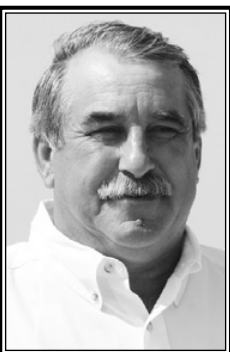

It Seems Just Like Yesterday

OLD ANCHOR FOUND BY

Huckaberry Finn had nothing on two adventurous Grand Chenier boys who made a discovery that has netted them a sizable treasure.

Dale McCall and Paul Dyson were fishing recently in Mud Lake near Little

Pecan Bayou, near where the Mermentau River flows through the Lake. At low tide the boys noticed an obstruction sticking out of the water. Upon investigation it was discovered that it was the upper part of an ancient anchor.

While visions of ancient Spanish galleons and pirate ships danced in their heads, the boys were sure that they had indeed stumbled upon a find.

Since it is a well-known

and established fact that the pirate Jean LaFitte frequented the area the boys thought this was probably left over from the wreck of one of the pirate ships which are reported to have gone down in the area.

The two boys engaged the help of Dale's father, Claude V. "Pete" McCall who is a boat captain and owns some deep sea fishing vessels.

McCall went with the boys to the anchor site and hooked onto it with a winch from his boat, after the boys had gone overboard to securely tie the anchor to the chain.

The anchor was so heavy it could not be lifted on board so McCall dragged it down the Mermentau River to the site of his boat dock in the town of Grand Chenier.

A winch truck was called in to pull the anchor onto shore. The ancient, barnacle encrusted cast iron anchor was found to still be in perfect working condition and is estimated to weigh 2000 lbs.

There didn't seem to be any mark on the anchor to give a clue to the ship it came from.

It was determined that it had to come from a big ship because of the size, and it was not from a pirate ship because it is made from cast iron.

A bit of detective work has led to the conclusion that it was probably from one of the early dredge boats that started dredging the Mermentau River around 1931.

The origin of the perfectly preserved anchor may never be known and the boys have not decided what they will do with it.

It is certainly valuable, since the price of scrap metal alone would bring them a handsome price.

AREA BATTERED BY HIGH WINDS

Cameron Parish got its share of the stormy weather that moved across South Louisiana Monday night. Fortunately there were no injuries here.

Possibly the most expensive damage was to two airplanes tied down at the Cameron airstrip. One, a small 4-place plane owned by Wallace Menhaden Co., had its tail torn off, and much other damage when a small office on the field was blown into the plane.

The other, the crop dusting plane used by the Mosquito Control Board of Cameron, was torn up from its anchor and thrown into some trees along the airstrip. Damages to this plane were estimated between \$10,000 and \$15,000. The top was taken off the Exxon Service Station in downtown Cameron and some roof damage was done to the new Troclair ice plant.

Cameron Parish sheriff deputies said their wind gauge recorded winds up to 80 miles per hour but were not sure if there was also a tornado involved.

CONTROL WORK TO BE AFFECTED

The damage to the Cameron Mosquito Control's airplane couldn't have come at a worse time, Bruce Cravens, manager, said this week.

The plane suffered damages when it was hit by heavy winds Monday night. Cravens said it may take weeks or months to get the damaged wings and tail section replaced.

In the meantime, one of the largest hatches of mosquitoes in a year or two is expected to hatch out between next Sunday and Wednesday. This

is because the rain that accompanied that storm and high tides have covered the hatching areas.

HACKBERRY HOMECOMING

Hackberry High School Homecoming is set for Friday, Nov. 8, and will climax a week of homecoming activities. The Homecoming Court has been selected by the student body and the queen will be chosen from three senior maids by the basketball teams prior to the Homecoming game Friday night with the East Beauregard Eagles.

Cameron Outdoors

TIME CHANGES

It's clock changing time Sunday, Nov. 4. This change of several weeks later, is now from the second Sunday of March until the first Sunday of November. Folks, set your clocks back an hour before going to bed, but officially it starts the old time at 2 a.m. Sunday Nov. 4.

Our cold fronts have given us 42 degree lows at night and with the north wind blowing, it feels colder, but nice beautiful days, a little choppy for some lakes for fishing, but still fishable.

Major migration periods begins for most waterfowl. I noticed last week when hundreds of coots landed in the Big Burn along the Gibbstown Road, there were four areas with several hundreds of coot in each flock, just crowded close to one another and splashing water as to say they're back where they want to be for the winter.

White shrimp are beginning to migrate to Gulf water as water temperatures cool, leaving our marshes. Folks are doing good castnetting, catching some nice large white shrimp.

Largemouth Bass in our northern lakes will begin to move away from the banks as water temperatures in our lakes fall. Our marsh bass will go to the deeper canals.

Hunters are busy as time is coming fast for our duck, coot, and geese season to open. As it looks right now, I think we'll have a good first split, as we already have quite a few ducks in our marshes already and I've seen flocks of geese on the north side of the intracoastal canal coming in.

FISHING REPORT

Calcasieu Lake is still producing nice trout and redbfish, although the lake has been rough. I talked to some anglers in the Sulphur area and they have been doing good in Turner Bay on trout. I noticed last Friday, there were quite a few boats launched at the Prien 210 launch and boats were fishing the banks on the north side of the 210 bridge as well as the south.

There have been lots of fish caught at Lambert Bayou weirs this year as running

water helps the fish feed. The U. S. Corp of Engineers is supposed to start repairing the levees that were damaged by Hurricane Rita, which could have an effect on fishing, as the water flows in and out freely, with bait fish and shrimp coming out of the marsh.

Although I prefer using artificial baits, this is the time of the year I don't mind using fresh shrimp on a popping cork, especially for Redfish, not only on the lake, but also in the marsh where a current flows or along the points of small islands.

There's nothing more enjoyable than during duck hunting season, to go out and get your limit of ducks and then have the old rod and reel handy and catch a limit of redbfish in the same marsh area.

HUNTING NEWS

We all know the price of gas has had a hard hit on hunters as well as sports fishermen, but looking at the price of shotgun shells has made my head spin. What I paid last year for a box of 12 gauge #4, 2 3/4 shells, is about \$3 higher. I'll say this, a hunter will have to make every shot count and start chasing crippled ducks if you don't have a dog. It's nothing to knock a duck down with one shot and shoot three or four more shots if the duck is crippled and a little far from the blind.

They say an average hunter spends \$1,638 every year on the sport, but I think a few more dollars has to be added to that cost as everything is higher priced than last year. It is also said that Americans buy annually 1.1 billion dollars on shot gun shells alone. It is also said that more Americans hunt and shoot, than play golf.

I may have to look into the "pasture pool" sports of golf, but I guess I'd lose too many balls and of course the price of a set of golf clubs is more than five shotguns, so I might as well stick to hunting ducks, coots and geese, rails, doves, and so on.

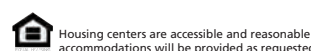

Stained glass installed at Our Lady Star of the Sea

CAMERON — More than two years after it was devastated by the winds and water of Hurricane Rita, the Church of Our Lady Star of the Sea will soon be in better shape than it was before. The recent installation of stained glass Stations of the Cross has brought the church that much closer to completion. The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, will bless the Church on Sunday, Nov. 18, at the 10:30 a.m. Mass.

Even though Masses have been held in the Church since the June 27 liturgy remembering the hundreds lost in Hurricane Audrey in 1957, there were still details remaining. The Rev. Joseph

McGrath, pastor of Sacred Heart of Jesus Church in Creole, will also shepherd the faith community of Our Lady Star of the Sea. Masses at the Church are celebrated Saturday at 6 p.m. and Sunday at 10:30 a.m. while weekday masses are at 5:30 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, and Friday and at 7 a.m. on Wednesday.

The 14 Stations were cut, built, and installed by Frank Thompson of Moss Bluff. Thompson is a well-known stained glass artist, having done work in a number of churches in the Diocese of Lake Charles, including St. Peter the Apostle in Hackberry, St. Mary of the Lake in Big Lake, and St. Theodore in Moss Bluff.

At Our Lady Star of the Sea, 30 windows lent the church to a symmetrical placing of the stations.

"The extra spaces seemed almost intentional," Thompson said. "You know, I feel very honored to be able to do this work."

Thompson is the son of the late Deacon Paul Thompson.

The contract for the Our Lady Star of the Sea Stations of the Cross took about six weeks, according to Thompson.

"The Cameron Church is a testament to what has happened in our area as far as recovery from the hurricane," Thompson said.

Comments on a *Time* Magazine Article

In the September 3rd issue of *Time Magazine* there appeared an article entitled "Her Agony", in part a review of the recently published book *Mother Teresa: Come Be My Light* (Doubleday). The book documents the letters of Blessed Teresa of Calcutta to her spiritual directors over a period of 66 years. It is thus an intimate look at this great and holy woman and her spiritual journey.

I only met Blessed Teresa of Calcutta once almost twenty years ago. She had come to Lafayette to open a convent for her sisters. Before a congregation of 13,000 people in the Cajundome, the largest crowd yet to have been accommodated in that sports arena, she spoke. Her message was simple and in perfect consistency with everything she lived. She extolled the value of human life, decried the evil of abortion, and restated the goal of her Missionaries of Charity to cherish the lives of those society discards.

Following this event and the retirement for reasons of health of Msgr. Alexander Sigur, I became the confessor and chaplain to the Missionaries of Charity in Lafayette for almost twenty years. I consider it one of the blessings of my life to have given them their weekly confessions. We frequently read and discussed the Constitution of the society, written by Blessed Teresa herself.

I must confess I do not read popular news magazines, but what prompted me to read this one was the comment of a friend of mine. He said, "What does it mean for *Time Magazine* to say that Mother Teresa had doubts about the existence of God?" While I do not consider myself by any means an expert on the life of Blessed Teresa or on the spirituality of saints, I am not unaware of the issues presented in the article. Upon reading the article, I was also satisfied that the denial of God by a Blessed of the Church was not what this article was about. To understand one must make a distinction.

There is a big difference between doubting the existence of God and the dryness that a spiritual person eventually senses in prayer. A skeptic doubts. An agnostic doubts. A person who has lost faith or is coming close to doing so can doubt. Usually when someone doubts, he looks for answers to questions at an intellectual level. When we speak of someone who has devoted herself to Christ dramatically, totally, and prayerfully, with as much conviction as is humanly possible, then we are speaking of something different indeed. We enter into a spiritual world, where the experiences and the vocabulary that describes them are different.

What we find in Blessed Teresa of Calcutta is a woman of serious prayer. I do not wish to oversimplify, but anyone dedicated to a life of prayer will eventually experience a spiritual dryness. All of the spiritual guides and saints of our Church speak of this. The classic one and the one alluded to in the article is St. John of the Cross. He describes this dryness as the "dark night". It is a period that begins a purging of the senses. In effect, God is inviting the soul into a deeper union, and since God is totally other, the person in prayer must be cleansed or divested of the "sensory." Allow me to

quote St. John of the Cross himself:

Souls begin to enter this dark night when God, gradually drawing them out of the state of beginners ..., begins to place them in the state of proficients ... so that by passing through this state they might reach that of the perfect, which is the divine union of the soul with God (*The Dark Night*, 1,1).

In her devotion to conversation with God, Blessed Teresa of Calcutta had reached a point of communion with Him that was experiencing profound purification. As the postulator of her cause, the Rev. Brian Kolodiejchuk, points out in the article, "She was a very strong personality, and a strong personality needs stronger purification."

The result of this purification was the opposite of despair. As Blessed Teresa writes in one of her letters to her spiritual director at the time, "... for the first time in ... years—I have come to love the darkness—for I believe now that it is part of a very, very small part of Jesus' darkness and pain on earth." Thus, she concludes, "Today really I felt a deep joy—that Jesus can't go anymore through the agony, but that He wants to go through it in me." She wrote this in 1961. The experience she describes reminds me a great deal of St. Paul's words. "In my own flesh I fill up what is lacking in the sufferings of Christ for the sake of his body, the church" (Colossians 1:24). Such is the language of mysticism.

Perhaps the deficiency of the *Time Magazine* article, as well as my humble attempt to address it, is the magnitude of the topic. How can such a deeply spiritual subject receive adequate coverage in popular print? The author of the magazine article says that Blessed Teresa's struggles can be an encouragement to other less saintly people. Words have meaning, however. Words like "absence", "agony", "emptiness", and "darkness" for the worldly person and the spiritual one mean two very different things. In the world, we try to avoid them. In the spiritual, we embrace them. For the skeptic or non-believer, they are bitter realities. For the one who loves God, they are sweet. For the one who loves not the self but the other, they are the beginning not the end.
