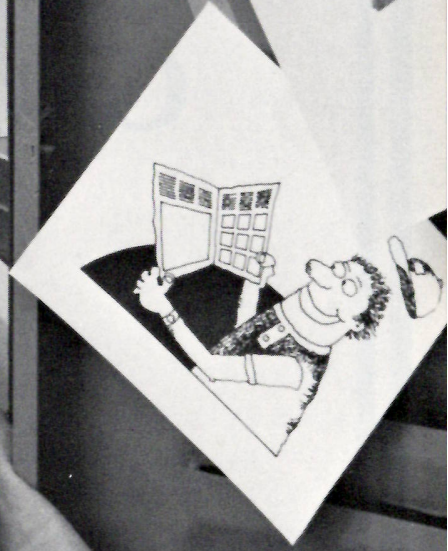

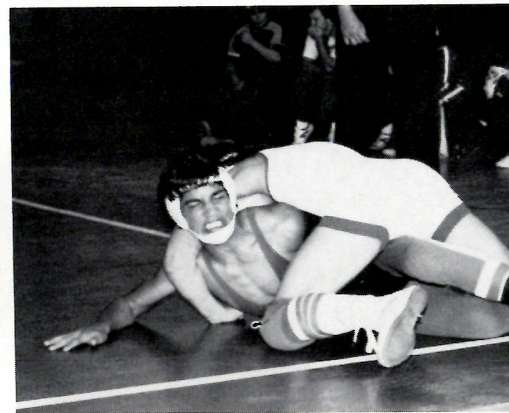

help each other and in a way to be like brothers.

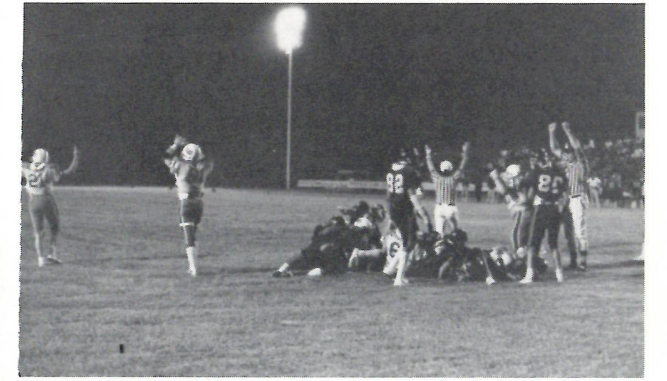
I wanted to tell him that I really did care

Oh how sad it was when everybody cried.

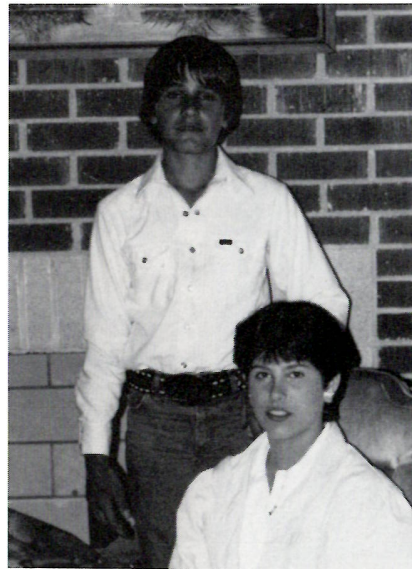
I knew it was sad for Bubba to go

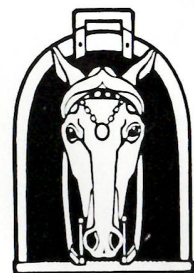

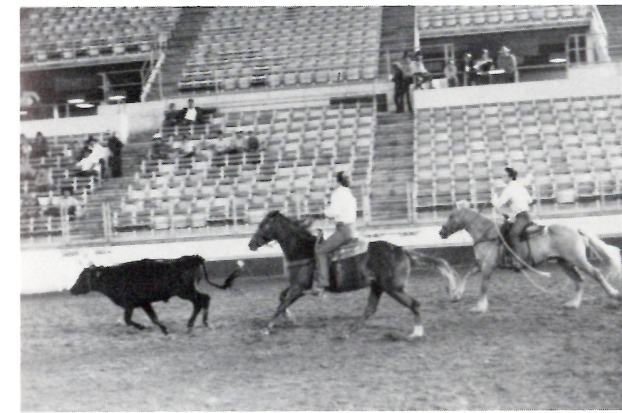

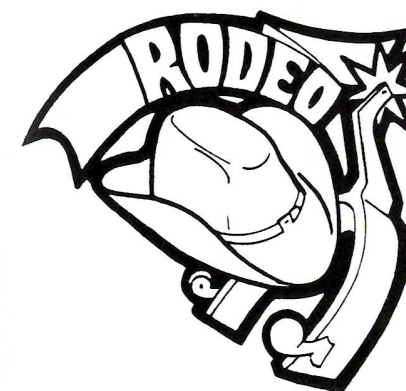

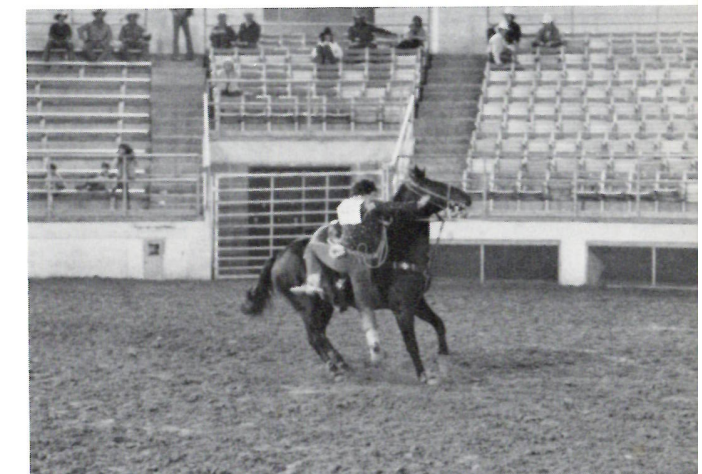

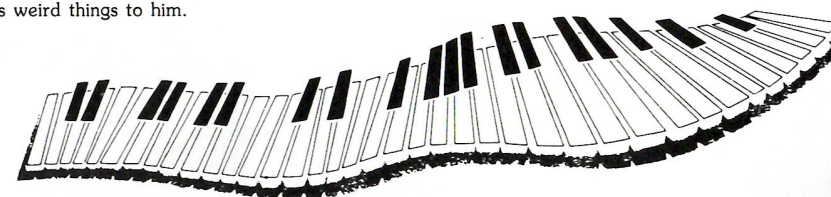

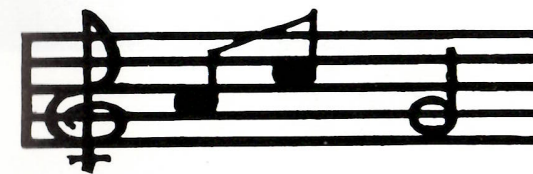

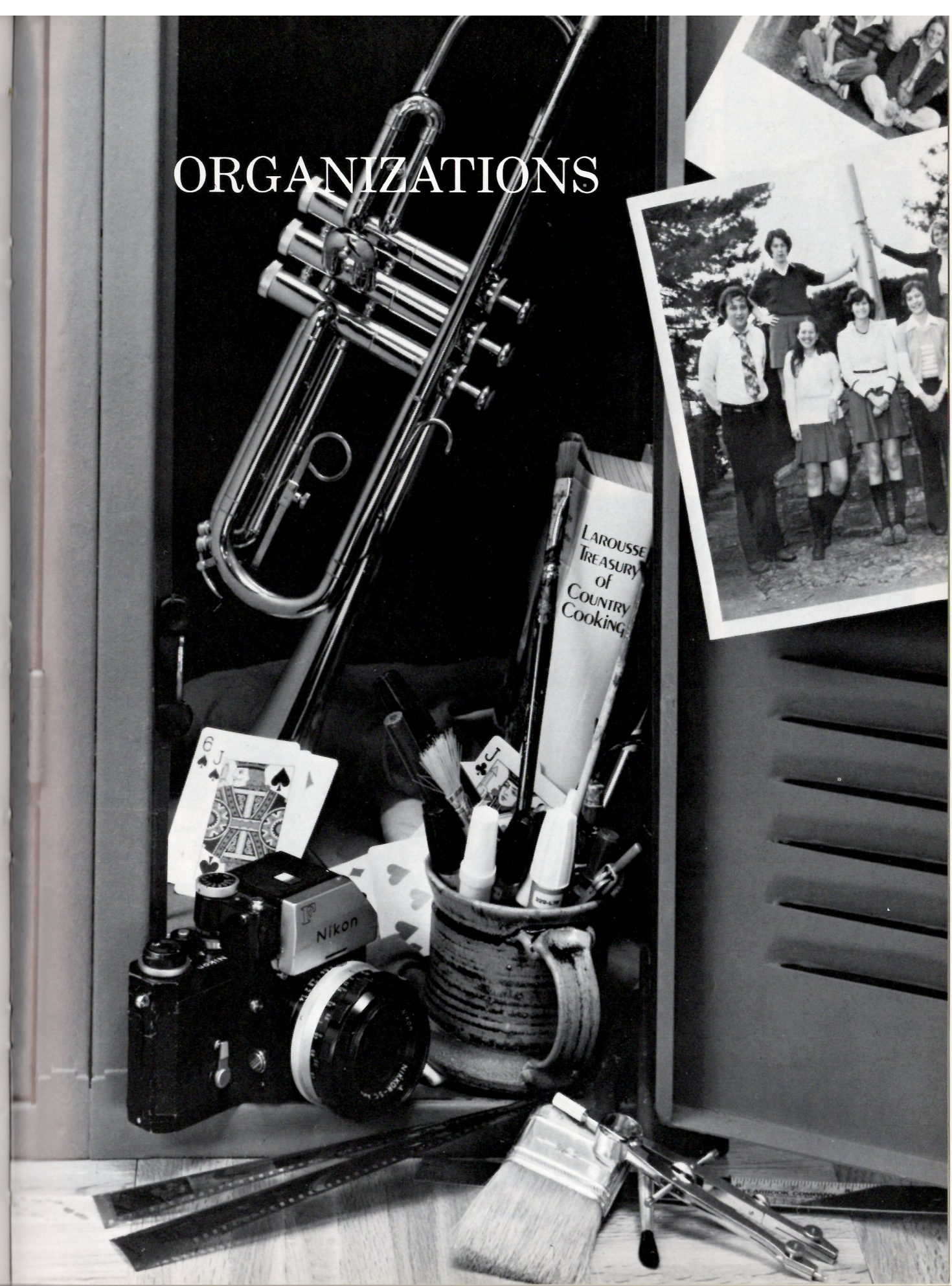

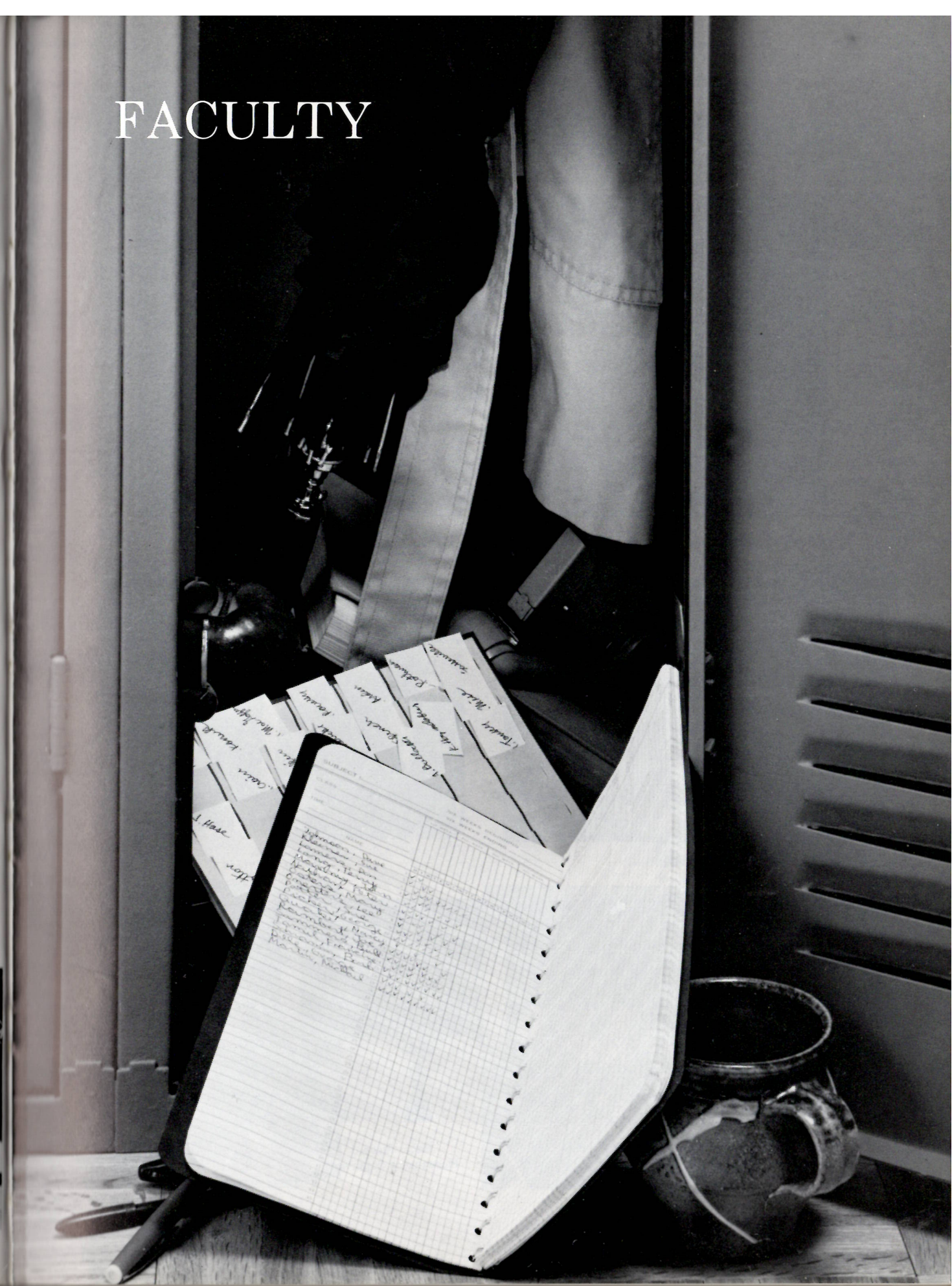

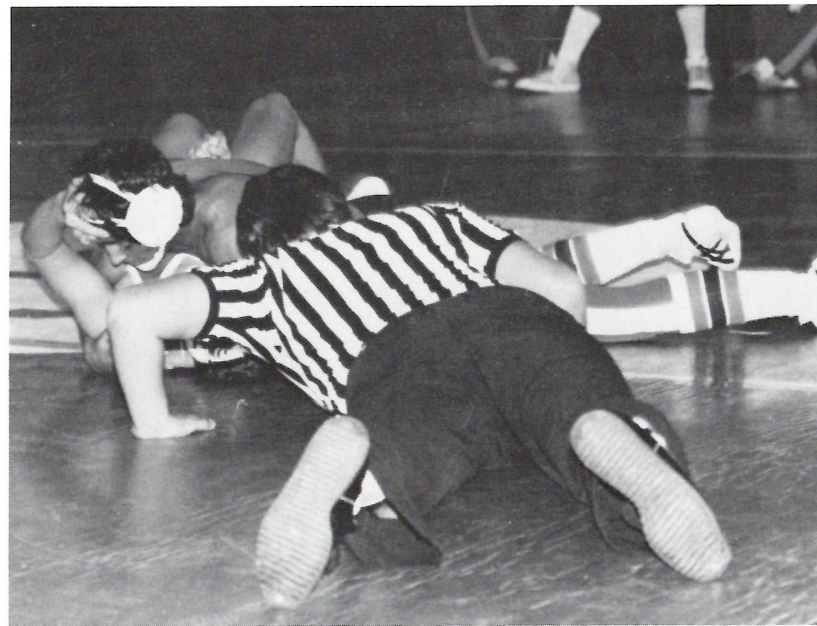

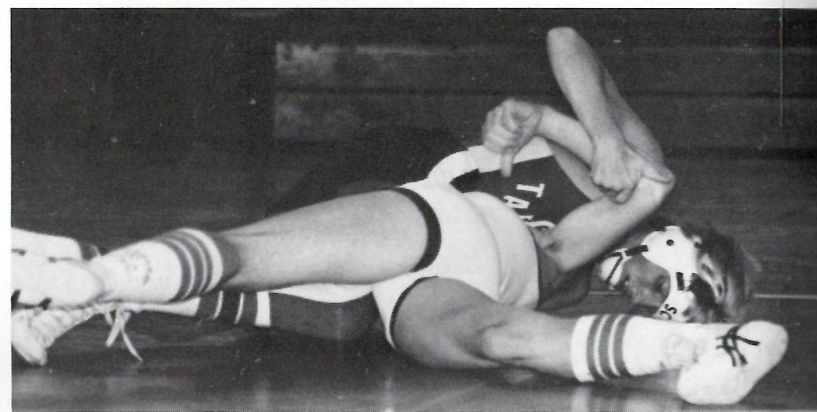

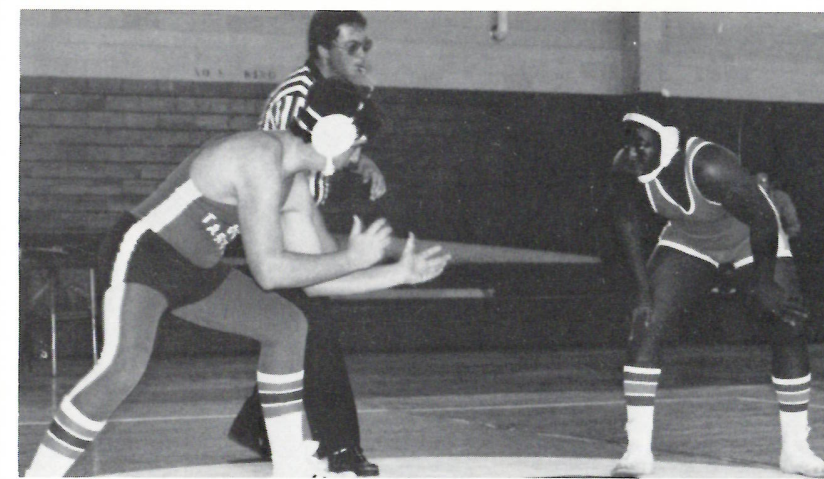

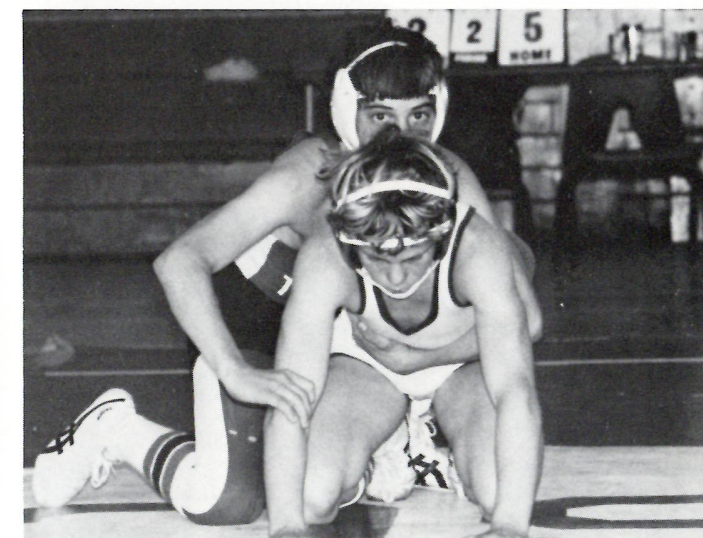

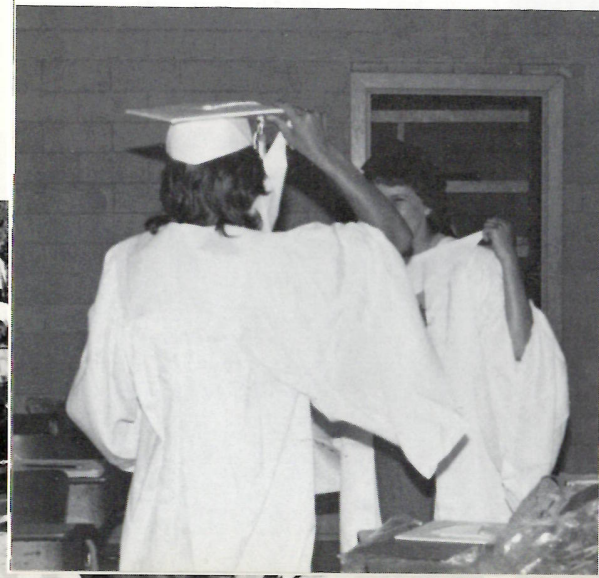

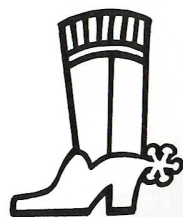

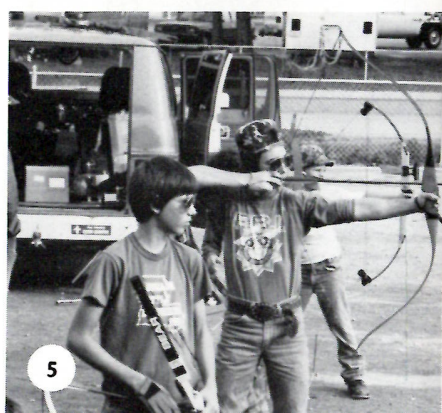
South Cameron Student Is Crowned Queen

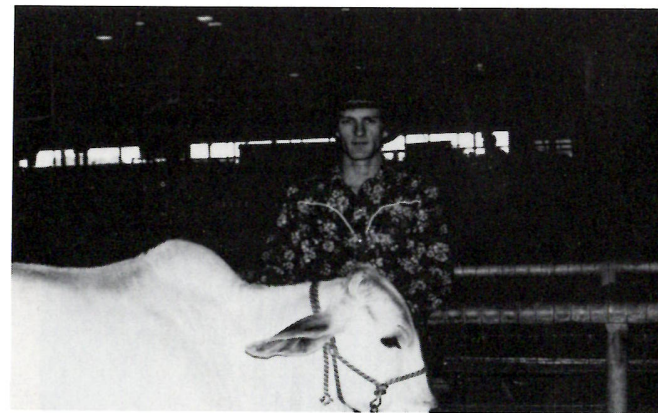
Students Work Hard With Animals

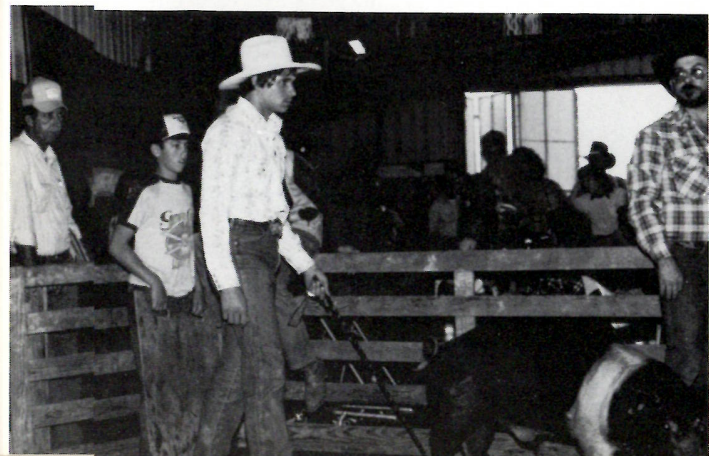

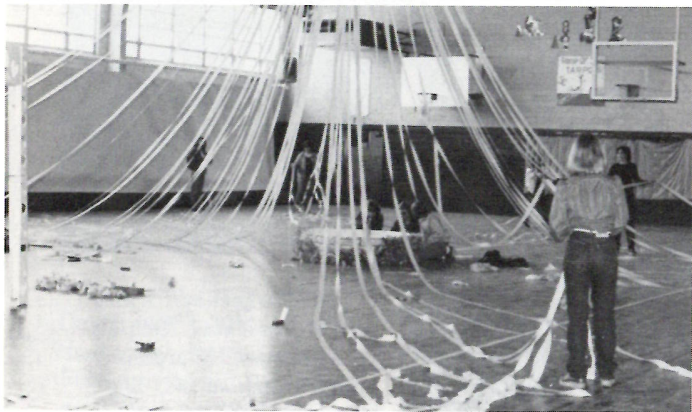

SAPE Plays Encourage Students

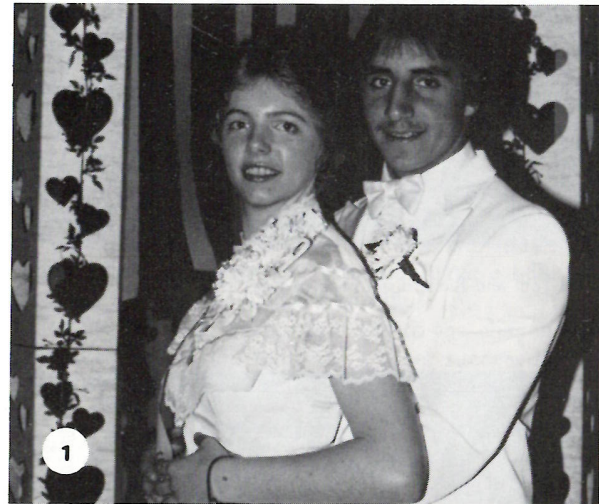

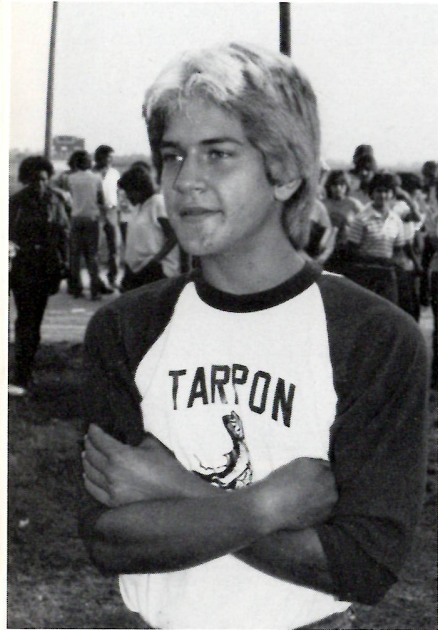

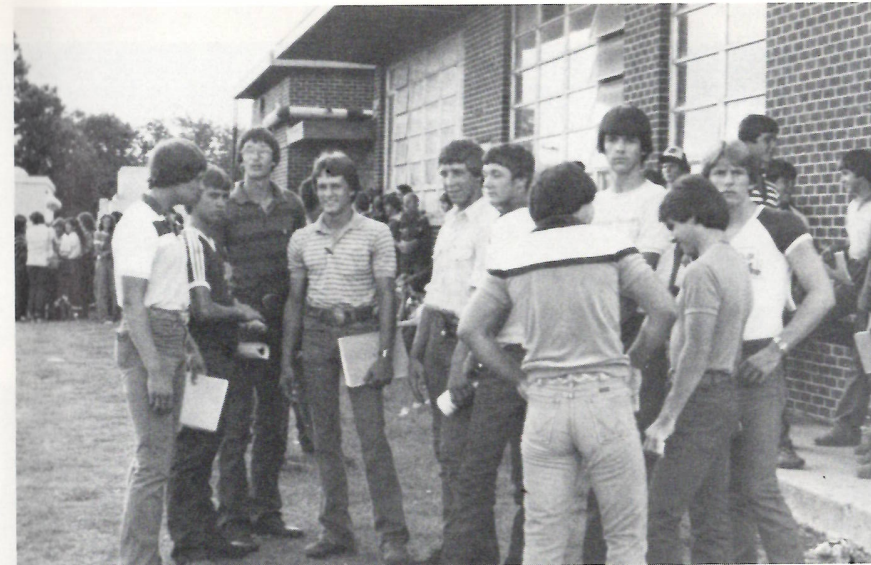
